Alfalfa Prices Decline During Week In Oregon

WASHINGTON, July 9.—Alfalfa markets were generally weaker during the week ending July 8th. Offerings at most markets were somewhat in excess of demand, particularly for the medium and lower grades, which constituted the bulk of receipts, according to the weekly alfalfa market review of the United States bureau of agricultural economics. Top grade offerings, however, continued scarce and moved readily. Contracting for

future deliveries and purchases by mills are far more numerous than in the season of the year, due largely to the poor credit situation. The outlet to daymen also continues to be considerably restricted because of low prices for dairy products, which have stimulated extensive use of green feeds and cheap feed grains.

Receipts were moderate at Kansas City and mostly of out-of-condition hay, which continued to sell at considerable discount. Top grades were in good demand, however, and quotations on the limited offerings of hay of that quality were advanced 50c to \$2.00 per ton. Shipping demand was scattered and mostly from cities where top grades were wanted.

The lightest movement in some months was reported at Denver with old crop supplies practically exhausted and the new crop not yet moving in volume. U. S. No. 1 alfalfa was reported very light at Houston where U. S. No. 1 alfalfa was quoted delivered at \$23.50 per ton. The fourth cutting of alfalfa is in progress in Arizona. The quality and quantity are reported above average, but low prices have resulted in nearly all going into storage. About 20,000 tons are reported stored in the Salt River valley. This is not far from normal at this season of the year, however.

Prices declined 50c to \$1.00 per ton at Portland, with total receipts for the week only five cars. Most of this hay was from the Hermiston and Walla Walla districts and sold to the Portland trade at \$18.00 to \$19.00 per ton. Good pastures in Western Washington and Oregon, as well as substitution of oats—vetch and clover hay continued to limit the demand for alfalfa in that section. Receipts at Spokane were also light and demand fair. No demand or movement was reported at Seattle where No. 1 second cutting alfalfa for fall delivery was quoted at \$16.50 per ton. Seattle.

Dean of Sacred College Passes At Vatican City

VATICAN CITY, July 9.—(AP)—Cardinal Vannutelli, 93-year-old dean of the Sacred college, died late today after several days' serious illness. Vincent Cardinal Vannutelli was one of the great figures of the Sacred college in the years before his advancing age compelled him to curb his activities.

For many years he was the principal diplomatic representative of the Vatican and because of his peculiar position for the role is said to have attended as representative of the pope at more important and royal and imperial ceremonies than any other member of the Sacred college.

His services to the church began with his ordination to the priesthood in 1860. For more than half a century thereafter Cardinal Vannutelli's missions took him to many countries. He became dean of the Sacred college in 1914 upon the death of James Cardinal Gibbons of Baltimore.

The venerable cardinal, ever an apostle of peace and good-will, is said to have been responsible for the inauguration of negotiations looking toward a settlement of the age-old Roman question during the early years of the regime of Premier Mussolini.

Mussolini visits him
In 1924, for the first time since the hope was stripped of his temporal power in Rome, the head of the Italian government had a private talk with the dean of the Sacred college, Cardinal Vannutelli.

Mussolini was on a visit to the province of Caserta and stopped at Malsano, where there is a monastery. Cardinal Vannutelli was a guest there and Mussolini went to pay homage to him. Afterwards the two had a private talk of more than half an hour. Although the subject of their conversation was not made public, it was the general belief that the discussion included possible efforts to settle the historic controversy.

Cardinal Vannutelli was born December 5, 1836, at Genazzano, in the diocese of Palestrina, of a noble family that had been conspicuous in that diocese. His brother, Serafino Vannutelli, also was a cardinal and dean of the Sacred college at the time of his death in December, 1915. The grandfather of the two cardinals was Count Vannutelli, who was grandmaster of the household of Napoleon's sister, Princess Pauline Borghese, and afterward to her mother, Letitia Borghese.

Montreal from 1905 to 1910, respectively.

When the cardinal went to London to preside at the sessions of the congress in 1908 he was the first papal legate sent to the British capital since the days of the Reformation.

After the Montreal congress in 1910, Cardinal Vannutelli visited the United States and made a tour of some of the larger cities. He attended the exercises in connection with the consecration of St. Patrick's cathedral, New York, during which he delivered an address.

Cardinal Vannutelli was prominently mentioned as a candidate for the papal throne at the conclaves which elected Pope Pius X, Benedict XV and Pius XI.

Closing Strong In Wall Street Today

NEW YORK, July 9.—(AP)—Becoming bored with pessimism, some traders endeavored to stir up a little bullishness in today's stock market, but found the speculative fraternity inclined to be suspicious and apathetic. The short covering which appeared yesterday was repeated further, and share prices generally made for progress, but trading progressed at a snail's pace.

The weekly report of freight car loadings covering the week ended June 28, showed a gain of nearly 16,000 cars over the previous week.

Constructive operations in the late dealings were concentrated in large part on such shares as American Can, Consolidated Gas, Westinghouse Electric, Chesapeake and Ohio, and Air Reduction, which were up 3 to 7 points. U. S. Steel hovered around 156 and the list generally absorbed profit-taking well. The close was strong. Sales approximated 1,400,000 shares.

REPUBLICAN DIFFICULTIES INCREASING

approached by a number of senators who have protested against Huxton. He would not estimate how many. Meanwhile, much interest was taken in Washington today in the situation caused by Vermont reports the state committee there, Erie S. Kinsey, had been asked to take the national chairmanship temporarily at least, and in the white house don't think the president had had any communication with Mr. Kinsey.

Issues Positive Denial
The Vermont chairman at his hotel today said he had never been offered the party chairmanship.

"There has been no tender to me nor any discussion with me by President Hoover of taking the position now held by Mr. Huxton," he said.

Asked whether he would accede to requests to present the opposition to Huxton personally at the republican conference tomorrow, Watson said he was undecided. He said if 25 or 30 republican senators proposed he take such a course, he would consider it seriously, but he would defer everything to the wishes of President Hoover.

There were indications today Mr. Hoover was showing considerable concern over the situation. He has been called upon to be umpire in a serious dispute between his party members and his national chairman, who also is his personal friend.

It was said today in the disgruntled republican circles that understanding had been "general" that Huxton would retire from the party leadership as soon as convenient.

Loathe to Undertake Task
Unless President Hoover is willing to go through with a program calling for the resignation of Huxton and his eviction if he refuses, party leaders are loathe to undertake the task.

Meanwhile, all attention centered on the conference called for tomorrow.

Kinsey went to the white house before noon to confer with Mr. Hoover.

Referring to a story carried in the Rutland, Vt. Herald, which said he had been offered Huxton's post, he said:

"There was evidently a misunderstanding on the part of the editor of the Rutland Herald. I have maintained in the past we would have been better off if we had supported Huxton solidly from the start.

"It is very evident now, however, that many prominent men in the republican party feel it would be advisable for him to retire."

Asked if he would accept the national committee chairmanship if it were tendered him, he replied "it won't be."

No Idea of Successor
Kinsey said he had no idea who would succeed Huxton should he resign. He said he regarded Senator Fess as an ideal man for the place, both personally and from the standpoint of political experience.

Representative Wood, of Indiana, chairman of the republican congressional committee, said after a call upon President Hoover he and Huxton had been friends for many years and that no man had been "traduced" more than the party chairman.

It is a shame Huxton had been placed in this position, the Indiana said, adding "there is no use of him attempting to vindicate himself at the expense of the whole party."

Two Men Admit Their Part In Adna Slaying

CHEHALIS, Wash., July 9.—(AP)—breaking down under incessant grilling, Blaine McCoy and Stanley Phillips, who with Matt Simila were held for the slaying Saturday night of Carl Krummel, Adna, Wash., postmaster and merchant, confessed last night, Sheriff Edward Deggeiler said that they had shot Krummel when he resisted robbery.

Prosecuting Attorney W. H. Grimm said the men will be charged with first degree murder. They were arrested early Sunday morning in Centalla about 10 miles from Adna.

Simila, 24-year-old logger, had previously made a confession in which he told officers he had waited outside in the automobile used by the trio while McCoy and Phillips entered the store, armed with revolvers to hold up Krummel. Later Simila led the officers to a slough near Chehalis where he had informed the officers his companions had thrown their guns after the holdup.

The guns were recovered.

Simila's confession, coupled with the finding of the revolver, Sheriff Deggeiler said, led McCoy to admit his part in the affair. Previously McCoy had denied knowledge of the murder, insisting he was too intoxicated to remember what took place Saturday night.

Deggeiler said that after McCoy had sent word from his cell that he was "ready to talk," it was necessary to take him on a long automobile ride to brace him up, because he was so ill from fear and the after effects of the liquor.

Phillips, when read Simila's confession corroborated it, officers said, but would not enlarge upon it.

40-YEAR-OLD MULE PLOWS FOR 87-YEAR-OLD FARMER
