FORESTS GET INCREASE OF ABOUT \$100,000

PORTLAND, July 10—An increase of \$100,000 has been allotted for 1936 for improvements on the 22 national forests of Oregon and Washington, according to regional forester, C. J. Buck, Portland.

The total set up for 1930-31 for permanent improvements, outside of roads and trails, on the national forests is \$200,500. These funds are to be spent for a variety of purposes, such as maintenance and construction of telephone lines, fire lookout houses and towers, ranger stations, firemen's shelters and cabins, barns, tool houses, water systems, and fences. Material, labor, and all details of this construction work are handled by the forest supervisors of the national forests concerned, and not by the regional forester in Portland.

The amount will be spent for the repair and maintenance of existing structures and also for new construction, and the projects are in the nature of permanent forest improvements which the U. S. forest service is developing on the national forests for better protection and administration of these public forest properties.

Each of the 22 national forests in Oregon and Washington shares in these funds, based on carefully worked out plans and estimates. The approximate amounts by states are \$75,000 for the 8 national forests of Washington and \$115,000 for the 14 Oregon national forests.

Some of the items are, for example, the maintenance of 10,216 miles of tree telephone lines, and the building of 880 miles of new line; the repair and maintenance of 117 fire lookout houses and towers; and the construction of 47 new ones; the building and reconstruction of 92 firemen's cabins and 78 shelters, barns and tool houses. Regional Forester Buck called special attention to the fact that road and trail construction and maintenance on the national forests is carried on under a separate congressional appropriation which is many times larger than that for protective and administrative forest improvements.

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Only One Chain For Each Station Is NBC Decision

The question of a single broadcast station acting as the outlet for programs from two chains has been settled again.

This time it was WBT, Charlotte, N. C., which brought about a decision from the National Broadcasting company very similar to that made in the case of WCCO, Minneapolis, a year or so ago.

In the WCCO incident, NBC held that it could not supply programs to a station on a rival chain "to the best interests of all concerned."

In the WBT case it declared that "it is essential to network broadcasting that associated stations be served by only one chain."

Both decisions were brought about by the affiliation of the stations with the Columbia Broadcasting system.

At the time of the WCCO change over, H. A. Bellows, station manager, contended that it was his privilege to select the best programs from either network.

The decision in regard to WBT followed announcement by CBS that it had purchased a "substantial interest" in the station.

Withdrawal of the NBC service, including the Amos 'n' Andy sketches, was not made until a week after announcement of the CBS purchase, giving that station the distinguishing of being the only one in the country to present a wide variety of features at both networks. There is one other instance, that of WMAQ, Chicago, which, because it holds the rights to Amos 'n' Andy, acts as key station for this NBC feature although it is a regular CBS chain station.

The position of NBC was outlined in a statement from M. H. Aylesworth, president.

"It is essential to network broadcasting that associated stations be served by only one system," he said.

"The cost of producing programs and transmitting them to stations over leased wires makes it mandatory that each associated station broadcast a certain portion of the network program available to it."

"If the time of the station were to be divided between its own local programs and those of two competing networks, there would be insufficient time for the programs of either network to justify the expense of network broadcasting in the backbone of radio in the United States. This service has been made possible only through sound and equitable cooperation between the broadcasting company and its associated stations."

ICE RESISTS MELTING

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP)—Ice that gets hot without melting until its temperature of 180 degrees has been made by Dr. P. W. Bridgman of Harvard university. This ice is produced by pressure of 200,000 pounds to the square inch.

NEW YORK (AP)—Magnesium, discovered 122 years ago, now is used for fireworks, airplane accessories, optical and motion picture industries, machine shops, building, medicine and perfumery.

SEEK EGGS OF DINOSAURS IN OLD ARIZONA

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Tracks of giant trachodonts, early Jurassic dinosaurs existing perhaps 40,000,000 or more years ago may lead to discovery of the eggs of these prehistoric animals in the rugged regions of northern Arizona.

Footprints of these giants have been discovered by Hubert Richardson, Indian trader, near Cameron, Ariz., and Rupert L. Larson, representing Robert S. Breyer, Los Angeles business man.

The findings were at an elevation nearly 700 feet higher than those of a dinosaur found in the same region last winter.

The nature of the terrain and the rock formation have lead explorers to believe that low lying hills of the plateau will not only yield a skeleton, but eggs of the trachodonts as well.

The largest track measured more than 20 inches from the tip of the center toe to the back of the heel.

It was deeply impressed in a region where prints were found in profusion, with the separation between the toes not as clearly marked as in the tracks of other trachodonts in the vicinity.

RISE, FALLING OF EARTH SEEN AS ORIGIN OF CAVES

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP)—The origin of caves is ascribed to rising and falling of the earth's surface by Prof. W. M. Davis of Harvard.

Caves he says in a report to the Southwestern Division of the American association for the Advancement of Science, show evidence of forming by dissolving of solid limestone in water. This occurs while the land is below the ground water level.

Millions of years later when earth movements have elevated this land above water level the caves stand for ages, slowly refilling with the materials produced by calcareous dripping.

MICROSCOPE MOVIES SHOW NATURE'S INNER SECRETS

YONKERS, N. Y. (AP)—A microscope motion picture laboratory has been installed at the Boyce Thompson Institute for Plant Research.

It pictures minute organisms hairs and roots too small to be seen unaided. Corn in three minutes is shown from seed to six weeks' growth.

Nasturtiums and other flowers, plants and vegetables have been photographed.
