## BEAT BOBBY IS INTERLACHEN CRY

### America's Golfing Stars Open National Open Championship Play.

MINNEAPOLIS, July 10 (AP)—Beat Bobby Jones!

That was the cry at old Interlachen today as America's golfing stars—

and a Britisher, too—faced a blaring sun and a veritable purgatory of traps and bunkers in their first major offensive for the cherished national open championship.

If the emperor of golf has cracked under the mental strain of his invasion of England, he has failed to show it during four days of practice on the championship course.

The Jones stand have not been quite up to the Jones standard, but his iron and putting game looked just like they have for the past eight seasons.

Among those in the race, representing pro golf are Walter Hagen, Horton Smith, Johnny Farrell, Gene Sarazen, Tommy Armour, Macdonald Smith, Leo Diegel, Al Espinosa, Bill Mehlhorn and Denny Shute. A host of dangerous amateurs, including Great Britain's entry, Cyril Tolley, and the present and former American national amateur champions—Jimmy Johnston and George Von Elm—also were granted outside chances.

From a glance at the championship course and past performances, it appeared that Jones chief menaces were Hagen, Farrell, Armour and Horton Smith.

Interlachen, stretching over 6,872 yards, doesn't boast the tough reputation of many of the former national open courses, but it does have pitfalls galore. The rough holes are a great menace for those who have a habit of slapping their drives along the fairway fringe. A ball landing one foot off the fairway is in a more dangerous spot than a ball sliced or hooked 20 feet off, as the rough thins out away from the fairway.

Tricky Greens The greens are of a bent texture and the golfers complain each has from three to four different slants or rolls. There are eight par four holes, however, than can be reached with a drive and a sound mashie-mallet shot; there are four easy par three holes, four par five holes that promise to produce birdies, and two par four holes that require use of woods in the fairways. These last two holes are expected to make or break golf hopes. They are the first and fourteenth and there is trouble there for any golfer.

Estimates on the total needed to win the 72-hole medal play championship today varied between 287 to 298. Hagen, one of the shrewdest conservers of the game as played and as

a player, estimated 294 would win. Jones thought it would be around 292.

"If anyone gets a 287, we all might as well pack up our war clubs and go home," Bobby said.

Today's initial drive was 18 holes and a similar round will be played tomorrow with the final round Saturday. If a playoff is necessary, as it has been for the past three years, it will be decided Sunday.

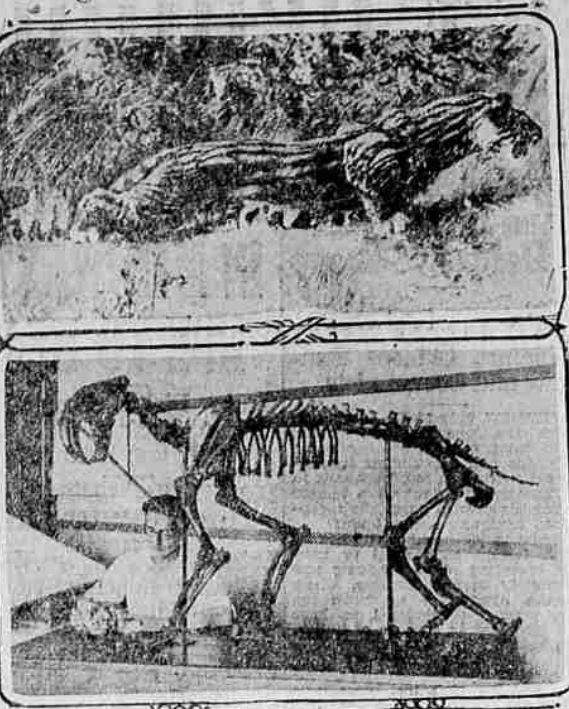

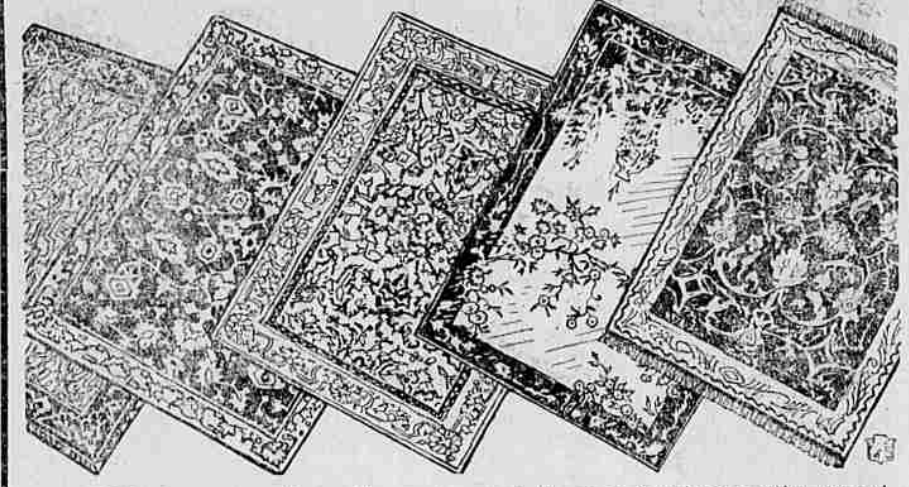
No fireworks need be set off prematurely over American chances of regaining the Davis Cup, yet prospects are at least brighter as a result of the finishing tennis exhibited by the Yankee youngsters on Wimbledon's classic turf.

Doeg and Mangin shone, but Allison scintillated. No American achievement on the courts in years, not even Big Bill Tilden's dramatic singles triumph over Lacoste in 1928, so sparkled and stirred popular interest as the blond Texan's triumph in straight sets over Cochet of France, the world's champion and the supposedly invincible.

There is now the same fiery intensity to his game that characterized Johnston. Allison will be 20 years old December 8, but his development as an

internationalist has been concentrated in the last two years. He crushed his way into the "first ten" for the first time in 1928, ranking fifth and Sam Hardy, in his annual analysis of the top flight for Spalding's guide, commented:

"By speeding up his game and by many timely advances to the net behind some of his deep drives, Allison overcame all opposition except the very best. His baseline game is exceptionally sound on both wings, his smashing is deadly and his volleys carry a punch that usually end the point. His service is delivered facing the net. He relies almost entirely on the second ball, which has

good length and some break. Allison's apparently poor physique is deceptive, as he usually outlasts an opponent in a five-set match."

One of the most dangerous of all rivals for Bobby Jones in the National Open at Interlachen may be his dapper professional conqueror of 1928, Johnny Farrell. The slim young Irish lad has given unmistakable signs of coming back upon his game after a considerable period of decline. His victory in the New York State Open over a high class field with the excellent total of 286 may be just the tonic Farrell needed to make him fit for the main event of 1930.

Johnny suffered the embarrassment of having his game go to pieces last year in the Open at Winged Foot, just across the road from the home course of the Parrells, Quaker Ridge, and right out before all the neighborhood. He hopes to redeem himself this year and some marching home again with something for the folks to cheer about up in Westchester.
