The mercury rose to 101 at Wallace and 93 at Moscow, Idaho, and to 98 at Spokane and 95 at Yakima, Wash. Unsettled conditions, with probable thunder storms, were forecast for the region today. Low temperatures prevailed in Western Washington, the highest reported at Seattle being 78 degrees. The forecast for Western Washington was continued cool weather.
