## BENEFIT PLAY AT PLEASANT GROVE GRANGE

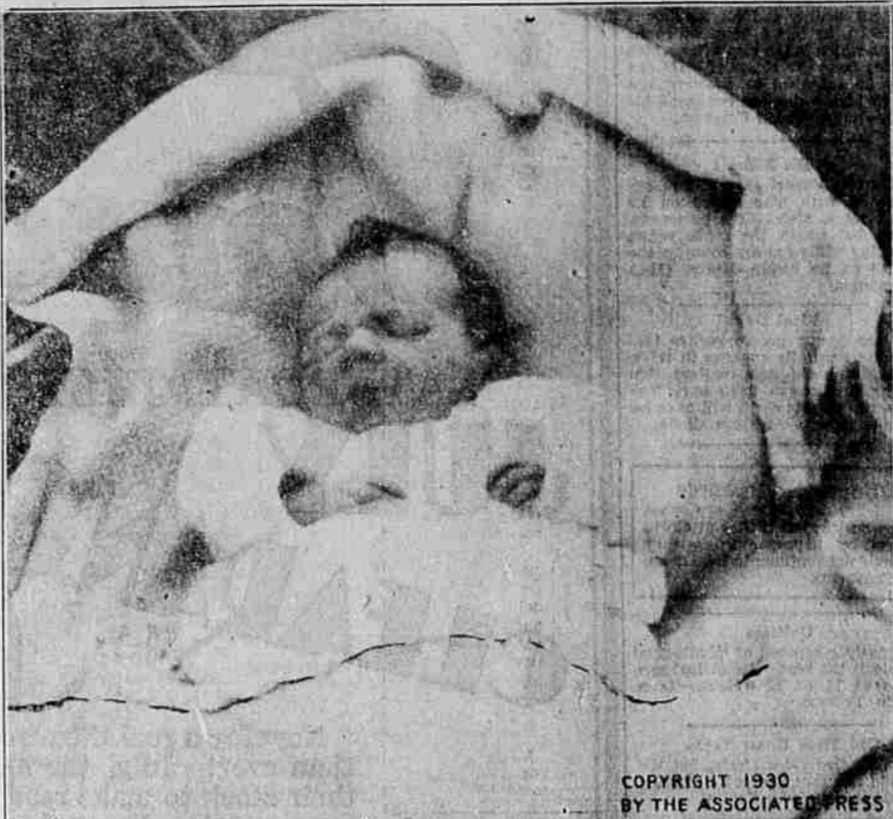

## Von Bernhardt Passes Away At Berlin Thursday

BERLIN, July 11 (AP)—General Friedrich von Bernhardt, who led the imperial army both in victory and defeat, died here yesterday at the age of 81.

In the year of 1870 General Von Bernhardt was the first German officer to enter Paris after its fall. In 1912 he wrote an article predicting an Anglo-German war.

At the outbreak of the World war he was commander of the home units of the fiftieth army corps but at his own request was assigned to a field command.

He was an early advocate of the use of asphyxiating gases and before the end of the war was recognized as one of the premier strategists of the imperial army. In a book published less than a decade ago he predicted a war of the future in which gases and airplanes would play major parts.

General Von Bernhardt was born November 23, 1849 at St. Oetersburg, the son of the counsellor of the Prussian legation. Schooled in Germany for a military career, he even as a young man came into the limelight.

He came in the forefront of troops entering Paris in 1911, and boldly leaped over the chained barrier the French had stretched across the entrance to the triumphal arch, waiting there alone for the rest of the Prussian army.

He was best known to Americans through his book, "Germany and the Next War," which was widely read and cited against Germany and the allied countries during the World War. He made himself unpopular in pre-war days in Germany by continually harping in his writing on "unpreparedness" of Germany for an inevitable European war.
