Publishers Enter Wheat Arguments

WICHITA, Kas., July 11 (AP)—Max M. and Louis Levand, joint publishers of the Wichita Daily Beacon, today entered the wheat acreage reduction controversy by calling upon Alexander Legge, chairman of the federal farm board, for his resignation and an apology to Kansas beet growers.

They made public two telegrams which they said had been sent to Mr. Legge and to President Hoover. The message addressed to the president was in these words: "Alexander Legge, chairman of the farm board, in his speech Thursday at Dodge City, made statement that 'biggest loss' will always be in trough. Kansas is now in the trough. This is insult to 1,850,000 people and we ask apology from Mr. Legge and, since he says he has done all he can do to help farmer, we ask his resignation. Please be kind enough to reply to this telegram as people of state of Kansas are awaiting answer."
