## Ovation Given Dodge Marathon Car By Broadway

NEW YORK, July 12—Downtown New York turned out July 2 to welcome the Dodge Eight "Mileage Marathon" car upon its arrival in the metropolis prior to its beginning a serious of coast-to-coast runs that are expected to continue for several years.

The car, which is being driven at ordinary touring speeds in an attempt to pile up more miles than any automobile ever built, was met at 125th street by a police escort and rushed to the City Hall, where Mayor James J. Walker welcomed Lou Miller, driver, and Ray Priest, official American Automobile association observer, to the city. The run is being sanctioned by the A. A. A.

The marathon car left Detroit yesterday noon with much ceremony. W. F. Chrysler, president and chairman of the board of Chrysler Motors, and K. T. Keller, president of Dodge Brothers corporation as well as city officials of Detroit, officiated. The route of the car included Buffalo, where a stop of only a few minutes was made. State Troopers met the car at Poughkeepsie and acted as an escort into the city proper.

Lou Miller, famous cross-country driver, who is taking the car on its first transcontinental run, was given a letter by Mayor Walker to Mayor Ralph of San Francisco, where the first cross-country drive begins its return trip to the east.

The "Mileage Marathon," it was explained by Dodge Brothers officials who were in charge of the New York ceremony, is a test of the dependability of the new straight eight manufactured by their company. It is in no way a non-stop nor a speed trial. Conditions paralleling those met with by the ordinary motorist will prevail throughout the months that the car is operated. The only distinction made between ordinary driving and the marathon run is the element of time. This Dodge Brothers car will pile up as many miles in a month as the everyday driver would in a year.

From New York the marathon car left for Philadelphia, the next stop on the leg of a journey which will take it to Columbus, Dayton, Indianapolis, St. Louis, Dodge City, Albuquerque, Flagstaff, Los Angeles and San Francisco.

## Chrysler Reduces Salaries 10 Pct.

The Chrysler Corporation authorized the following statement in connection with a ten per cent cut in salaries which has just been put into effect:

"The ten per cent reduction of all salaries which Chrysler Corporation has made is consistent with a re-

"The Chrysler organization is determined to operate its business on a profitable basis under whatever conditions may exist, and the readiness to make all necessary sacrifices as indicated by this move is a factor of strength which is bound to be reflected in the ultimate success of the company and its continued progress in the automobile industry."

## Stages To Give Vacation Driver An 'Even Break'

SALEM, Ore., July 12 (AP)—Vacationists who drive automobiles are in a hurry. They have only a short time in which to make as much distance as possible. Often they are forgetful of traffic dangers. Therefore, Oregon stage drivers, by orders from headquarters, are going to make concessions to them that legally may not be required.

Secretary of State Hoss recently learned from traffic officers that some stage drivers were violating the law relative to speeding, taking too much road, and stopping their vehicles too near the center of the highway. Hoss wrote about it to E. W. Lemen, vice president of the Pacific Greyhound Lines in charge of operations in Oregon.

Lemen issued a bulletin to his drivers, reminding them that violators of the law would be dealt with severely.

He added:

"Those 'other cars' are out working against time to squeeze in a short vacation, and their drivers are not thinking of the dangers on the highway. Therefore, it remains for us to be on guard, and to give them even the best of the deal to avoid trouble."

## Red Menace Is Seen In Revolt Against French

HANOI, French Indo-China (AP)—The Viet-Nam-Quoc-Dan-Dang and the Viet-Nam-Quoc-Dan-Dang, the chief native political parties, joined in a coalition to make life miserable for the handful of Frenchmen governing 20,000,000 Annamites and Tonkinese.

"Union for disaster," the French leaders here call the truce between the former warring parties.

Heretofore the communists while showing great enthusiasm in their demands for abolition of the tax on rice and reduction of costs of livestock, seemed to lack the shrewdness of war to organize open rebellion. But since their union with the nationalists they have acquired arms and ammunition and their attack upon Vinh-Lang, fifty miles southwest of Saigon, was made with determination and military cohesion.

"You must refuse to pay the tax and allow yourself to be arrested in groups," were instructions handed down by leaders to the manifestants.

Nearly all the leaders of the Viet-Nam-Quoc-Dan-Dang—the nationalists—are behind the bars, but the movement gathered momentum with each arrest.
