Senate Sleuth On Job as Walsh's Aid

WASHINGTON (AP)—Investigation has become a habit with 30-year-old John Holland, of Montana, now out to help a senate committee uncover possible fraud in approximately 6,000 postoffice leases.

"I suppose I caught the investigation bee from Senator Walsh, who is always investigating something," says the Auburn-haired bachelor who came to Washington seven years ago as the law clerk of the Montana senator.

Trailing facts in the Teapot Dome and lobby investigations, as well as in the prohibition bureau in New York, have been some of Holland's activities since he was graduated from Georgetown university in 1923. He added a masters' degree in 1925.

Reticent, Holland speaks in a low and soft voice. Humorous brown eyes look out from a friendly face that carries the freckles commonly associated with red hair.

Holland drew his present assignment from Senator Blaine, of Wisconsin, chairman of the postoffice committee.

Witnesses soon will begin appearing before the committee.

Shrimp Salad, Serving 8
2 cups shrimp (fresh or canned).
1 cup diced celery.
1 cup diced cucumbers.
2 hard cooked eggs, diced.
4 tablespoons chopped sweet pickles.
2-3 teaspoon salt.
1-4 teaspoon pepper.
1 cup stiff mayonnaise.
Mix half the mayonnaise with other ingredients. Chill. Serve on lettuce and top with remaining mayonnaise. Garnish with pimiento stuffed olives.

Apricot Mold, Serving 8
2 cups cooked of fresh apricots.
2 tablespoons granulated gelatin.
1 cup boiling water.
2 tablespoons granulated gelatin.
4 tablespoons cold water.
1 1-3 cups sugar.
2 tablespoons lemon juice.
1 cup whipped cream.
3 slices sponge cake.
Soak gelatin and cold water 5 minutes. Add boiling water and stir until the gelatin dissolves. Add sugar. Mix well and allow to cool and thicken a little. Fold in apricots, lemon juice and whipped cream. Pour in 1 1/2 glass mold lined with sponge cake. Chill until stiff. Unmold. Cover with Almond Sauce.

Almond Sauce
4 tablespoons butter.
4 tablespoons flour.
2 1/2 cups milk.
1-3 cup sugar.
1-8 teaspoon salt.
2 eggs well beaten.
1 1-4 teaspoon vanilla.
1-3 teaspoon almond extract.
1/2 cup sliced almonds.

Melt butter and add flour. When blended add milk. Cook until creamy sauce forms. Stir constantly while cooking. Add sugar, salt and eggs. Cook 1 minute. Add other ingredients. Beat 2 minutes. Cool and chill. This sauce is very tasty when served on cake or puddings.

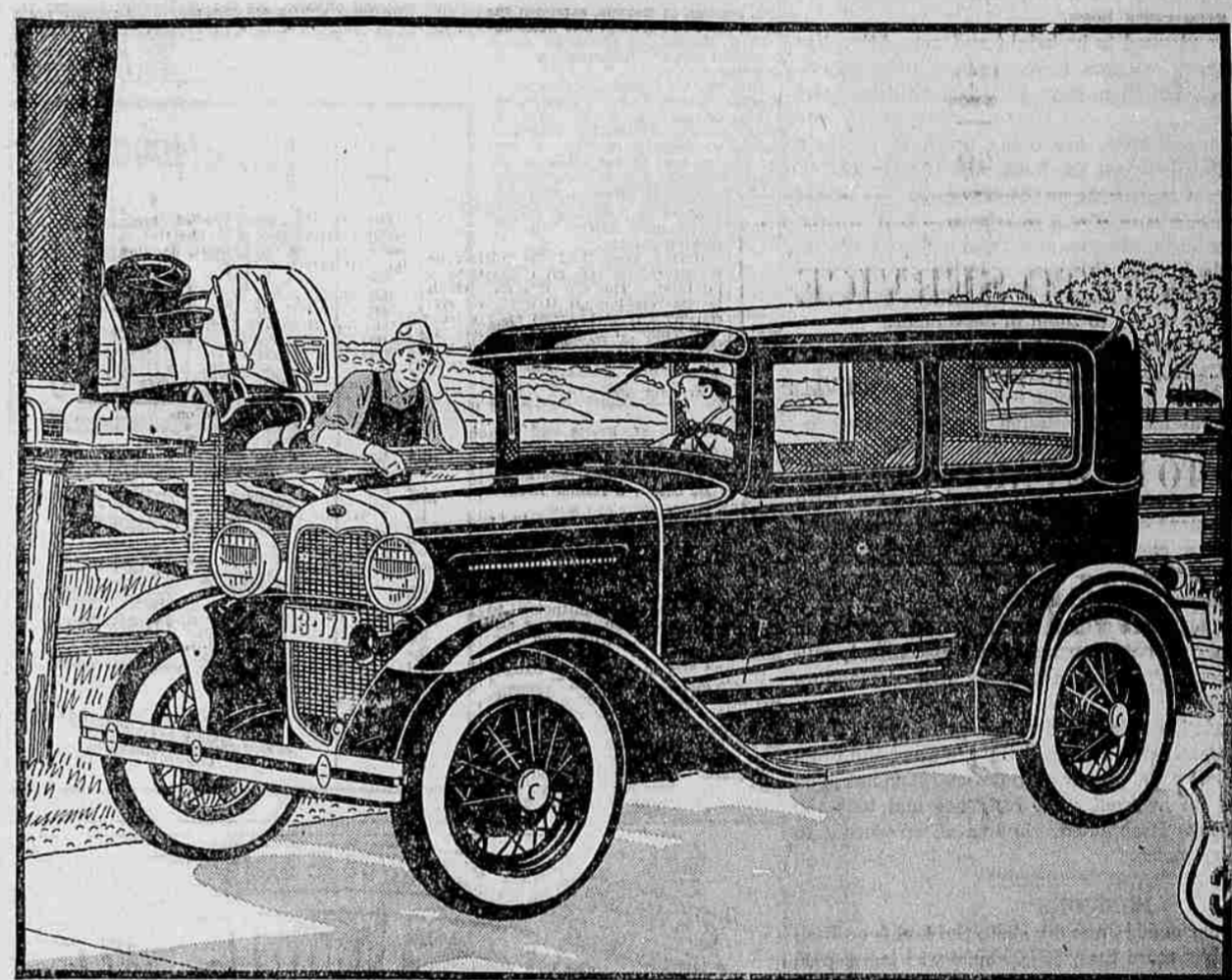
