WASHINGTON, July 17 (AP)—A total of 93 cities of 100,000 or over population, housing an aggregate of 36,393,221 persons, was shown by Associated Press census compilations. Announcement of the result of the census in Philadelphia, the last of the big cities to report, made possible a final count of the larger municipalities.

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EX-PRESIDENT DIES

SANTIAGO DE CHILE, July 17 (AP)—Juan Luis Sanfuentes, who was president of Chile from 1916 to 1920, died suddenly during the night of a heart attack.

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
