2 eggs, well beaten.  
 1 tablespoon finely chopped onions.  
 1 tablespoon chopped green pepper.  
 2 hard cooked eggs, sliced.  
 Melt butter and add flour. Mix well and add flour and cook until thick sauce forms. Stir constantly during cooking. Add rest of ingredients and beat 2 minutes. Pour into loaf pan that has been greased and bake 30 minutes in moderate oven. Unmold carefully and surround with creamed mushrooms.

**Creamed Mushrooms**  
 3 tablespoons butter.  
 4 tablespoons flour.  
 1 cup cooked or fresh mushrooms.  
 1/2 teaspoon salt.  
 1/2 teaspoon paprika.  
 2 cups milk.

Melt the butter and add the flour. Blend and add mushrooms. Cover with a lid and cook slowly until mushrooms have browned. Add milk, salt and paprika and cook until creamy. Stir frequently.

**Cake Fruit Dessert**  
 1 1/2 cups flour.  
 3 tablespoons baking powder.  
 1/2 teaspoon salt.  
 1/2 cup sugar.  
 1 egg.  
 1/2 cup milk.  
 1 teaspoon vanilla.  
 4 tablespoons butter, melted.

Mix all ingredients and beat 3 minutes. Pour into shallow pan which has been fitted with waxed paper. Bake 25 minutes in moderate oven. Cool and add the fruit mixture.

**Fruit Mixture**  
 1/2 cup sugar.  
 4 tablespoons flour.  
 1 cup water.  
 1 egg, well beaten.  
 1/2 teaspoon salt.  
 3 tablespoons lemon juice.  
 1/2 cup diced peaches.  
 1/2 cup diced pineapple.  
 1 tablespoon butter.

Blend the sugar and flour. Add water and egg and cook until mixture thickens. Stir constantly. Add rest of ingredients. Cook 2 minutes. Cool. Spread on top of the cake. Chill. Top with whipped cream and cut in squares.

## Borah Under Care Of a Physician

WASHINGTON, July 19 (AP)—Senator Borah returned to the senate chamber Friday after undergoing a physical examination at Johns Hopkins university hospital in Baltimore.

He disclosed he had been under the care of a physician for some time, although attending regularly to his work and taking charge of the London Naval Treaty in the senate as chairman of the foreign relations committee.

The Idahoan will return to the hospital today for completion of the examination and to obtain a report from the physicians.

## Turk, 156 Years Old, In America For Inspection

PROVIDENCE, R. I., July 19 (AP)—Azaro Agha, who says he is 156 years old, and the first 100 years were the easiest, landed here from Turkey Friday to get himself a set of false teeth and, for a consideration, to let American scientists have a look at him.

The date of his birth, as given on his passport, was February 16, 1774. This was based, said his great-grandson, Ahmed Muzsa, who accompanied him, on an actual record in the possession of the Turkish government.

Yellow and wrinkled, with a hawk-like nose, bristling grey moustache, and lively, curious eyes, weirdly alive in their sunken sockets, Azaro Agha sat in the sun on the deck of the steamer Sinaia and talked of wars and women, and the third set of teeth that he grew at the age of 100.

Agha indignantly denied a report he had divorced his eleventh wife to marry the present Mrs. Agha—"She's young, only 66"—who waits for him in Istanbul.

"Me? I never divorce any of my wives," he grunted. "I got along with them all, very nice, and they all died."

"Now women—I always am interested in them. I like them brunette best and plump."  
 Agha again today said he had never tasted alcohol in his life. Nor tobacco. He lives, he said, mostly on vegetables and sweets.

## GOLFER HITS WINDSHIELD OF PASSING CAR

"WANTED—An inventor who will perfect a non-hook and non-slice golf club. No doubt, such a club would have a rather wide sale and, at least, one motorist would be pleased."

One day recently, A. R. Tyson, of Seattle, was driving his Viking along the highway near a golf course. All was quiet and peaceful in the car, when wham! A report, not unlike that of a pistol was heard and there appeared suddenly in the windshield an almost perfect duplicate of a spider's web.

"Wha! thia —" ejaculated Tyson. It was then that he and his passenger learned that the windshield of the Viking had been struck by a sliced golf ball, driven from one of the trees near the highway. Since the glass fell into the driving compartment and the windshield was not shattered, it did not occur to the motorists for a moment just what had happened.

"It was fortunate for us," says Tyson, "that the Viking windshield is of non-shatterable glass. Otherwise, at the speed we were making, it is entirely possible that a serious accident might have occurred."

## WIND MOA SKELETONS AND EGGS IN NEW ZEALAND

AUCKLAND (AP)—A fine complete skeleton of a huge moa, the skeleton of a moa chicken and fossilized moa eggs as big as footballs have been found in the Moawhanga valley in the north island of New Zealand.

This big, flightless bird, standing about 12 feet high, has been extinct for centuries. When white men first came to New Zealand they did not believe the Maori legends about the great birds.

Moawhanga name of the valley where the relics were found, means in Maori, "valley where the Moa drink."

## NATIVES AND BRAZILIANS GET PORTUGAL'S JOBS

LISBON (AP)—To stem the tide of unemployment, the government has decreed that no jobs shall be given to foreigners. Brazilians, excepted.

Foreigners in employment here may keep their places, but when they retire, die, or are "fired" their places will be filled by Portuguese.

"Unemployment lists are drawn up, and the home office will issue weekly figures. Foreigners of technical skill may be hired if the home office approves."

## VETERAN GETS MEDALS 30 YEARS AFTER WAR

SHANGHAI (AP)—After waiting 30 years, Oscar Romahn, veteran of the Spanish-American war and the Boxer rebellion, has received his service medals from Washington.

Romahn, a Norwegian by birth, enlisted in the American navy for the war with Spain and was sent to Dewey's fleet. He served through the Boxer rebellion, then left the service to join the Chinese maritime customs from which he recently retired after 25 years' duty.

For two decades he bombarded Washington with letters trying to get his service medals. But they had been misplaced by some government clerk.

Ten years ago he quit his letter-writing. He had given up all hope when the medals arrived.

## Entries Closed For Northwest Airplane Tour

PORTLAND, Ore., July 19 (Special)—Entries for Pacific Northwest States Air Tour, which starts from Vancouver, Wash., on July 28, to wind around through Oregon and Washington, have been coming in rapidly to the office of Russell Lawson, preliminary organizer of the tour. The final key on these airplanes—more than 50 have been promised—will be made by the executive committee composed of members elected by the representatives of the cities sponsoring the tour.

Among those already entered will be Dudley M. Steele, manager of the aviation department of Bichfield Oil company, flying a specially designed Stearman, powered with a J5, 300-horsepower motor with the newly developed reversible propeller; Elmer Bronte, heading the aviation department of the Associated Oil company, flying a Boeing four-place mail and passenger biplane, known to the trade as the 40B4; Bob Allen, pilot, flying the Standard Oil company's tri-motored Ford monoplane; Jimmy Fletcher, pilot, flying a Shell Oil company Stearman biplane powered with a J5 motor; and Lieutenant-Colonel Theodor Glimmer Oil company, flying a high-wing Hornet-powered Lockheed monoplane, with his five-month-old lion who has been with him on his famous flights across the continent.

W. A. Lench, Union Oil company, flying a Travelair, J5, 300, and Larry Cooper, Texaco Oil company, flying one of the latest designed Spartans.

The airplanes from the oil companies all show the most modern developments in aircraft design and equipment. They are all equipped with high-powered motors all of them radial. Brilliant colors cover these planes, so that they will make a colorful display on the respective airports visited.

Not only are the planes of unusual interest but the pilots attract considerable attention throughout the country. Many have established records, and many are nationally famous.

Applications for entry in the tour have piled into Russell Lawson's office for similar reliability and safety trips such as these have proved to be extraordinarily popular in New York, Illinois, Michigan, Canada, California and many other sections with large populations. By the cooperation of Oregon, Washington and other states the most scenic tour of the country is assured in the Pacific Northwest. The tour will stop in Eastern Oregon at Pendleton, La Grande and Baker.

The last date for entering the tour was Friday when the representatives from the cities sponsoring it met at the Multnomah Hotel, Portland, Ore., to draw up itinerary, and hourly departures and arrivals.

## Nominations Not Due This Session

WASHINGTON, July 19 (AP)—Doubt was expressed Friday by President Hoover that nominations for the reconstructed tariff commission would be sent to the senate for confirmation this session.

Pointing out that the six members of the commission are to represent both parties; that they must represent different regions of the country and fill other requirements, the president said he would need more than two or three weeks in which to form the commission.

The membership of the newly created power commission also may be held up until the December session of congress. Mr. Hoover said he had been unable to complete the group and that if necessary the three members of the cabinet who now compose the power commission could carry on until December.

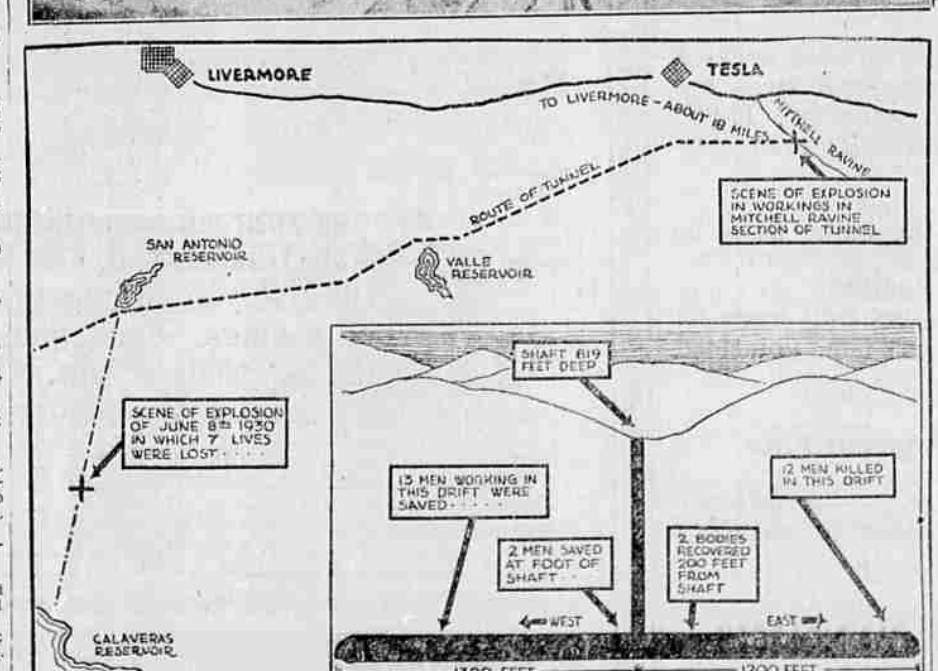
