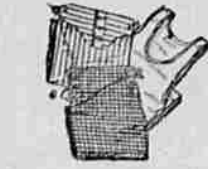

DEMAND GOOD FOR APRICOTS, CANTALOUPE

PORTLAND, Ore., July 19 (AP)—The price of the butter and egg market continues unchanged, with top grades of both steady and in fair demand. Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says:

Oregon's carlot movement of early green peas has about terminated, with a few cars yet to move from the Troutdale district. Production in that district was reduced about one-third from early expectations, due to ravages of mildew during the past two weeks. Improved local demand is taking all of Brown's offerings; otherwise there would be a few cars to move from that region. Probable volume of mid-summer peas from Devil's Lake and Marshfield is an unknown quantity, as yet. Good peas are selling at 5-6c per lb. to Portland retailers.

Apricots and cantaloupes are enjoying excellent demand this week. Prices are reasonable—neither too high nor too low—and volume of movement is heavy. "Green beans are in over-supply, and prices have dropped to 3-4c per lb. "Good hunched turnips are practically non-existent this week. Other hunched vegetables are plentiful though, and prices are steady."

CLOSE HEAVY AS WEEK ENDS IN EXCHANGE

NEW YORK, July 19 (AP)—With weekend business surveys giving no tangible indications of recovery, stock market traders today appeared inclined to feel the rally in share prices had been carried far enough, and hurried to take profits before the weekend shutdown.

The bull forces failed to rush in toward the close and drive stocks back up again as they have during recent sessions when profit taking was heavy. This was a little disappointing, as Wall street had expected an effort would be made to close the week with a strong market, to help speculative sentiment. U. S. Steel closed only 1/4 lower, but Westinghouse Electric lost nearly three points, American Telephone and Byers about four and Eastman Kodak seven.

The close was heavy. Trading was in small volume, total sales for the two-hour session falling below 880,000 shares.

WOOL MARKET

Moderate quantities strictly combing and similar quality fleeces worth of 64's and finer and 48-50's grade were sold at firm prices. Isle of Pines Says Nuns Get Treasure Chart

SANTA FE, Isle of Pines (AP)—Rumors persist that Sisters of Charity who operate a citrus farm near here, have come into possession of several ancient maps indicating the location of a long-buried hoard which is believed to consist of church property of great value.

Santa Fe, once the capital of this island, was sacked and burned by Sir Francis Drake late in the 16th century, so history tells us, "by way of singeing the beard of the king of Spain."

For years the rebuilt town was a rendezvous of buccanniers and pirates. A mango grove at the northern end was the scene of many wild revels when the swashbucklers of the Caribbean came ashore to divide their bloodstained loot.

Sword blades flashed and pirate duels were fought to the death. Besides those mangroves nine unmarked mounds testify that the dead were buried where they fell. Hallowed ground could not sepulchre those who followed the black flag.

On certain nights the Cuban sky is marked by what the "Pineros" term "El Camino de Santiago" or "the road of St. James." It is a sort of Milky Way, and when it appears, the mango grove is avoided by country folk. They say that it heralds the arrival of restless buccannier spirits who come to hold ghostly revels on their old stamping ground.

Many believe that the Isle of Pines is the locale of Stevenson's "Treasure Island." Its landmarks correspond with those in the entertaining story which has kept more than one youngster awake at night.

Cuba claims 50 per cent of all treasure trove, and it is said that the government recently made a "find" of its own. This "find" rumor had it, was made by convicts at the Isle of Pines prison who, while quarrying marble, came upon the entrance to a cave which was filled with mysterious chests.

Nothing was heard of the chests after they had been sent to Havana to be examined, so the rumor went. Whether there was any truth in the story is doubtful, but it has served to revive interest in pirate caches.

dom not to arrest game violators." Clifford declared, "nor have I ever resorted to intimidation or 'framing' of wardens as was charged. "I have instructed wardens that no

"The department has suffered much criticism on account of this attitude toward taking in women and children."

70 Dead, Hundred Missing In Orient

TOKYO, July 19 (AP)—Incomplete reports from typhoon stricken Kyushu island tonight listed 70 known dead, more than 100 missing, 737 injured, 4200 houses destroyed and more than 13,000 homes damaged.

Hundreds of boats were sunk or missing in the storm which struck yesterday, the wind at one time reaching a velocity of 112 miles an hour.

Senator Norris Wins Over Grocer

LINCOLN, Neb., July 19 (AP)—George W. Norris, the insurgent republican leader in the United States senate, has won out over George W. Norris, the grocery man from Broken Bow.

Reversing the decision of Secretary of State Frank Marshall, Chief Justice Charles A. Chase of the state supreme court, ruled last night the grocer's name should not appear on the republican ballot for United States senator in the August 12 primary as his filing did not reach the secretary of state's office until two days after the time limit had expired.

Senator Norris' friends said he accepted the ruling and had abandoned his plans of running as an independent.

LOS ANGELES, July 18 (AP)—Mrs. Mae Sunday, divorced wife of William Sunday Jr., son of the evangelist announced today she will marry her attorney, Wallace Davis, of Los Angeles, Sept. 20, the date her divorce becomes final.

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
