Domestic Wheat Market Stronger During the Week

WASHINGTON, July 21.—Domestic wheat markets strengthened during the week ending July 19, largely as a result of less favorable prospects for spring wheat in the American northwest and Canada, but influenced also by a good domestic demand for new winter wheat and a better inquiry for most classes of North American wheat, according to the weekly grain market review of the United States bureau of agricultural economics. Corn markets continued firm under a good demand for the limited supplies. Less favorable crop prospects were also strengthening factors and prices advanced 2c to 3c per bushel at the principal markets. Oats and barley were steady. Rye had independent strength and flax regained some of the decline of recent weeks.

Deterioration of spring wheat as the result of continued drought in both United States and Canada spring wheat areas was the principal feature in the wheat market situation during the current week. The most serious damage has occurred in Southern Alberta and Southern and Central Saskatchewan. In these areas hill damage has been severe and losses exceeded those of any recent years, according to reports to the Manitoba Free Press. Conditions in Manitoba are favorable and the crop is practically all headed in that province. From 85% to 88% is headed in Saskatchewan and Alberta. The acreage of 24,583,000 acres, as officially reported July 1, is smaller than the acreage harvested last season instead of slightly larger, as was erroneously reported in last week's report. While the crop has deteriorated since the first of July according to trade reports, the condition is still materially better than a year ago.

European crop recovering
European crops are showing some recovery from recent unfavorable conditions as a result of timely rains.

DANCER CHARGES HE HIT HER



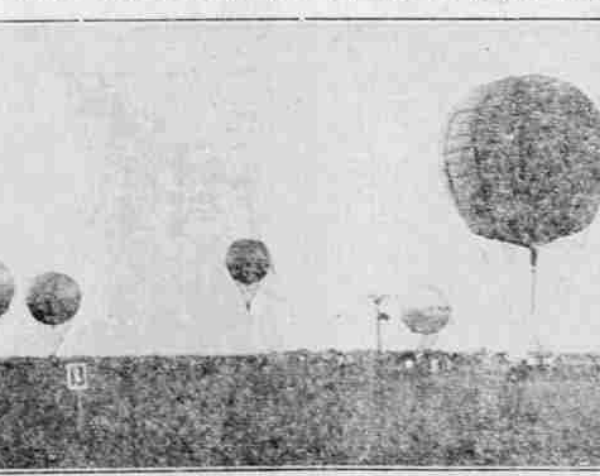
