DEAN SMITH IS WELCOMED IN PORTLAND

He expects to remain in Portland a couple of weeks. Then he will go south to look for a "ship" to enter the non-stop races from Los Angeles to Chicago this fall. He expects to re-enter the air mail service but just now he's a boy looking for a job.

Modern arctic exploration is an old-fashioned kind so badly distanced that there is no comparison. Dean learns by a chat with Lieutenant Smith. He said that one can go out in an airplane on a quiet afternoon and see more territory than the old-timers did by spending a summer with a dog sled.

"We would go up 5000 or 6000 feet and see for more than 100 miles on each side of us," he said. "We would go for several hours at the rate of 100 miles an hour, so you see how much territory we covered. In Bear's time they were lucky to go ten miles a day.

"I remember once coming back from the base line flight when we saw the Rockefeller mountains more than 150 miles away."

"What do you consider the most outstanding achievement of the expedition?" was the first question of the interview.

"Well, I suppose the great scientific discoveries would be first," he replied slowly, "but the public thinks the polar flight was the most dramatic feature. But to me the greatest thing was the way the program was followed out in practically every detail that Admiral Byrd planned weeks before we started."

Valuable Data Obtained
Notable data for weather men of the southern hemisphere were collected because the antarctic is the breeding place for weather south of it. It was stated. It is the breeding place for the southern storms, and the region just north of the Antarctic circle is one of the stormy on the globe.

Admiral Byrd was most thorough in his planning for the trip, and we had every possible supply that we wanted, with the possible exception of ice cream sodas," laughingly declared Lieutenant Smith. "There never really any suffering at all unless you can call a little hard work a hardship.

"During the 14 months we were on the ice I gained quite a lot in weight but have lost a good deal of it since getting back. Four of us cut out a gymnasium in the ice, and we enjoyed ourselves there at 55 degrees below zero more than I ever did in any other gym. We had boxing, weight lifting and other stunts. While we didn't exactly box in B. V. Ds we were lightly dressed. We also went in for skiing a great deal.

"There was no sickness and no deaths on the trip. Not a case of measles or mumps developed. While the cold was terrific we never were uncomfortable. I was out lots of times when it was 70 degrees below zero, but although I had to keep
