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YOUNG BRIDE CLAIMS BODY OF AVIATOR

WISCONSIN, Sept. 22.—A bride of a few months is among those who have claimed bodies of victims of mysterious airplane tragedy.

Mrs. Beatrice Young, wife of Lieutenant George George, 1, 2nd Lieutenant of the pilot flew Oregon from Los Angeles last Wednesday. He returned to Portland as flying instructor at Corvallis and she awaited him in London competing points for a holiday journey.
