Roseburg Man, 70, Awaits Grand Jury

ROSEBURG, Ore., July 23 (Sp.) — W. Hamm, 70, who fatally wounded John Barrett, his partner on a ranch near Drew, during a quarrel has been ordered held for the grand jury. A coroner's jury placed the responsibility for the killing upon Hamm. He told police he shot Barrett to death when the latter attacked him. The quarrel was over the measurement of a wheat field.

Hamm testified Barrett was subject to "fits" when "the moon was right." He described the argument and told of Barrett's alleged attack. Officers said they found the cabin in order, although Hamm told of a struggle. Pools of blood were found outside the cabin.

Hamm surrendered after shooting Barrett. He said Barrett sprang at him, and threatened him and then shot him several times around a table in the cabin before Hamm could get a gun.

Prune Growers To Release Members

ROSEBURG, Ore., July 23 (Sp.) — Due to an apparent poor outlook for prune prices this year, directors of the Douglas county prune growers have agreed to release members from the pool agreement and to permit consignments sales if desired. Representatives of the California Packing corporation and Rosenberg Brothers attended the meeting and agreed to buy for cash. They said, however, the price would be low.

No definite quotations are in prospect for the immediate future, buyers say.

The local association agreed to reduce its own handling charge from \$1 to 75 cents a ton.
