ANCIENT HURLERS DO THEIR STUFF

Old Jack Quinn Turns in Well-Pitched Game For the Athletics.

By Hugh S. Fullerton Jr. Whoever it was that said "youth must prevail" probably would be inclined to retract that statement if he should look at the major league box scores these days.

Five moundmen whose combined ages total about 200 years, were sent out to toil yesterday and while only one pitched a complete game, nearly all turned in good performances.

Adolfo Luque, Cuba's leading baseball hero, age 39, did a great job as he made first place in the National League safe for the Brooklyn Robins.

Luque held the St. Louis Cardinals to five hits through a trying duel with Sylvester Johnson, while Brooklyn slowly gathered enough momentum to win, 4 to 1.

Luque had only a one-run lead and it was not until the Cards had tied the count in the seventh that the Robins started hitting.

The Robins' gain was made possible by their neighbors, the New York Giants, who downed the Chicago Cubs, 8 to 6, to put Brooklyn a full game plus a few odd points in the lead.

The pitching in this contest was a matter of numbers rather than skill. Chicago using five hurlers and New York four.

Ancient Jack Quinn of the Philadelphia Athletics, whose years number somewhere near 45, above or below, gave the younger pitchers a lesson.

Quinn had a little trouble in the ninth inning and George Earnshaw finished the game for him as the A's downed Detroit, 4 to 1.

Urban (Red) Faber, second in age to Quinn in this quartet, did not figure as a winner or loser for the Chicago White Sox.

After holding a 1-0 lead for five innings, Faber weakened and allowed the Boston Red Sox three runs in the sixth.

Hal McKain relieved him and got credit for the victory as Chicago rallied again and gained a 6 to 3 decision.

Washington came back after three straight defeats and pulled out a 10 to 9 victory over the St. Louis Browns in eleven innings.

Another youngster of 30 years, Eddie Rixey, of Cincinnati had a bad inning and was behind when taken out for a pinch hitter in the eighth.

Blas Johnson was credited with the victory as the Reds rallied in the ninth to win the game, 8 to 7, for Boston.

TILDEN MATCHED WITH BOROTRA

Fate of Davis Tennis Cup Rests on Broad Shoulders of Big Bill Tilden.

PARIS, July 24 (AP) — William T. Tilden, of the United States, and Jean Borotra, of France, will dispute the first stages of the Davis Cup challenge round tomorrow at Roland Garros stadium.

The draw for the doubles match Saturday will not be made until the result of the first two singles is known tomorrow night.

The play will begin tomorrow at 2:15 p. m. (8:15 a. m. E. S. T.). The luck of the draw once again placed upon Tilden practically the entire responsibility of carrying the burden of American hopes to capture the Davis cup, for both American and French experts agree that upon the result of his match against Borotra rests the fate of the cup.

Experts felt that should Borotra defeat the American ace after seven successive beatings at the hand of Tilden, the United States would have to abandon all hopes for the trophy.

Cochet a Favorite Borotra came closer to defeating Tilden at Wimbledon a few weeks ago than ever before, and the memory of that day has remained with the big American.

Wilder Allison and John Van Ryn were the American selections for the doubles team but when Pierre Gillou reserved the right to name the French doubles team Saturday, Captain Dixon of the Americans refrained from making an official announcement.

In the opinion of all tennis followers here, when Tilden and Cochet, the world's greatest players, meet in the last challenge round Sunday, the matches are likely to stand at two all with that meeting the deciding issue.

Should Borotra stop Tilden and Cochet win from Lott and France lead two matches to one Friday, Jacques Brugnon and Christian Boussis will play for France in the double Saturday.

Pierre Gillou, captain of the French team, told the Associated Press today he might stake the fate of the cup in his two aces and call upon Cochet and Borotra to play the doubles in the first day's play should and in an even break.
