Date Coffee Cake  
(Suitable for breakfast, lunch or supper)

2 cups flour, sugar, baking powder  
1-3 cup sugar  
3 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
4 tablespoons fat  
1 egg  
1 cup milk  
Mix flour, sugar, baking powder and salt. Cut in fat with knife. Add egg and milk. Pour to thickness of 1 inch into greased pan. Top with the date mixture.

Date Mixture

2-3 cup chopped dates  
1-2 cup dark brown sugar  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
3 tablespoons soft butter  
Mix ingredients and press into the soft dough. Bake 20 minutes in moderate oven. Cut in bars and serve warm with butter.

Frozen Fruit Salad

1 cup mayonnaise  
1/2 cup whipped cream  
1 tablespoon granulated gelatin  
3 tablespoons cold water  
2 cups sliced peaches  
1 cup diced canned pineapple  
1 cup diced pears  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
Soak gelatin and cold water for 5 minutes. Dissolve over hot water. Cool and add to rest of ingredients which have been mixed together. Pour into tray in refrigerator and freeze 4 hours.

If preferred the salad may be frozen by packing in mold and burying in 3 parts of chopped ice to one part of course salt. It will require 4 hours to freeze.

Chilled Fruit Beverage, serving 8

1 cup sugar  
3 cups water  
1 cup grapejuice  
1 cup orangejuice  
1-3 cup lemon juice  
6 cups cold water  
Boil sugar and water 2 minutes. Cool. Add rest of ingredients. Chill. Serve in glasses half filled with chopped ice.

**AVIATOR WILL RECOVER**

BUTTE, Mont., July 24 (AP)—Major Gilbert H. Eckerson, Portland, Ore., aviator, whose plane crashed into a mountain side near Butte Tuesday, was conceded a good chance to recover from his injuries by attending physicians at a hospital here today.

He is suffering two small frontal skull fractures and cuts and bruises.

Eckerson was attempting a 24-hour one-stop flight between Portland and New York. He was found strapped in the cockpit of his demolished plane ten hours after the accident by a farmer's daughter.

**WOOL MARKET**

BOSTON, July 24 (AP)—Several sales although the aggregate was only moderate, have been closed on choice 12-month Texas wools and prices have been in range of 73 to 75c scoured basis. The bulk of current business on graded domestic wools is reported to be on 48, 50 strictly combing grades. The territory wools of this type are selling at 55 to 59c scoured basis and fleece wools are bringing prices in the range of 30 to 31c in the grease or 51 to 54c scoured basis.

**Seek To Revoke British Embargo**

WASHINGTON, July 25 (AP)—Secretary Stimson has assured Senator Swanson of Virginia he is doing everything possible to obtain revocation by Great Britain of its embargo against importation of some grades of American apples.

Senator Swanson wrote the secretary of state recently in his opinion the embargo was in "clear violation" of the treaty of commerce between the United States and Great Britain.

The secretary replied he had transmitted to the British government through Ambassador Dawes protests of the agricultural department against the embargo and also had conferred twice with the British ambassador here.

**U. S. NOT TO GIVE 'ETHER MOVIE' LICENSE**

WASHINGTON (AP)—Permission to transmit "ether movies" purposes have been given to the courts of appeal of the transmission of sound programs will not be given until visual broadcasting reaches a far higher stage of development, says the federal radio commission.

"Television is not yet ready to offer to the public as a whole," the commission says. "It is not yet possible to foresee exactly or with any degree of certainty just what engineering development will take place in the highly technical field of radio activity."

Although certain short-wave channels for experimental purposes have been set aside by the commission, it feels, however, that the manufacture of visual receiving sets as well as transmitting apparatus is "still highly experimental." It is therefore opposed to licensing broadcast stations to synchronize with experimental television stations.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., July 24 (AP)—Glenn H. Curtiss, famous aviator pioneer who died Wednesday in Buffalo, was recalled today by a former employer as "a lad with dreams in his eyes."

Curtiss began his career here at the age of twelve and it was while a messenger boy for the Western Union Telegraph company that he hit on the idea of providing mechanical power to propel the bicycle he used to deliver messages.

John A. Nolan, former chief operator for the Bell Telephone company, remembered the pioneer aviator as a dependable youth.
