COCHET-BRUGNON TEAM IS VICTOR

Young Americans, Allison and Van Ryn, Defeated in Davis Cup Play.

ROLAND GARROS STADIUM, AUSTRALIA, France, July 25 (AP).—The French team of Henri Cochet and Jacques Brugnon scored a surprising victory over the American combination of Wilmer Allison and John Van Ryn in the doubles play today of the challenge round for the Davis cup. The score was 6-3; 7-5; 1-6; 6-2.

The highly favored American youngsters, victors over the French in the challenge round last year and champions at Wimbledon this season, were no match for Cochet's smashing attack and the superb serving of the veteran Brugnon.

The French paraded through the first set, found it difficult to attack in the second as Wilmer Allison started somewhat after an erratic start, and then dropped the third set when Brugnon weakened. After a 10 minute rest, Cochet and Brugnon came back to smash the American opposition with ease.

French Almost Sure
The victory all but removes any hope the United States had of lifting the cup, lost to France in 1927. The French now lead in matches 2 to 1 with the final pair of singles scheduled for tomorrow.

After the match all four players were formally presented to President Domergue, who shook hands with them and congratulated both the victors and vanquished. He paid special compliment to Brugnon, who stood up splendidly under the concentrated attack of the Americans and completed their rout with his great serving.

GOLFER, 50, IS SHOWING WAY TO CANADIANS

ANCASTER, Ont., July 26 (AP)—As the Canadian open golf championship entered the last 6 holes today (Nicol Thompson Sr., Hamilton, 50 years old, continued in the lead.

He put rounds of 66 and 71 for a 36-hole score of 137 and a one stroke lead over Tony Manero, Eimsford, N. Y., who followed a 69 on his first round Thursday with another 69 yesterday.

A dozen crack professionals and two amateurs were within striking distance of the leaders.

Among the professionals, Johnny Farrell, Marquette, N. Y., and Walter Hagen, Detroit, boasted totals of 139. Farrell gained his by virtue of a spectacular 66 in the second round while Hagen played consistent rounds of 70-69. A stroke back of this pair were Emmet French, Southern Pines, N. C., and Al Watrous, Detroit.

Lehman, Couch Meet Today For Western Title

CHICAGO, July 26 (AP)—A pair of young Chicago golfers, Johnny Lehman and Ira Couch, both well known in their own ballfields, but little known outside, squared off today in the 36-hole battle over Beverly country club's narrow fairways for the western amateur title.

Lehman, who took the Big Ten championship to Purdue three years ago, was favored to win the trophy today because of his consistently brilliant play throughout the tournament.

He started off by sharing medalist honors and then eliminating the defending champion, Don Moo of Portland, Ore., these triumphs pale yesterday before his performance in defeating a former British amateur champion, P. Phillip Perkins, now a resident of New York.

Lehman not only removed the methodical British, who started the gallery Thursday by blazing over the difficult layout in 69 per-blasting strokes but did it in an overwhelming manner—4 up and 7 to play.

Couch displayed plenty of staying quality in defeating Bob McCrary, the fighting Scot of Des Moines, to reach the championship round. A less steady golfer would have cracked when McCrary stepped out and won the first three holes. Couch, however, stayed with it and as they made the turn in the morning round, was one up.

It was a give and take battle to the 17th hole of the afternoon journey, where Couch became the winner, 2 and 1.

Couch was accorded not quite an even chance of defeating Lehman, his path to the final match having been easier, and his victories not quite so impressive.

The final today marked the first time since 1912 that two Chicagoans have fought it out for the title. In that year Charles Chick Evans Jr., and Warren K. Wood in the championship round at the Denver country club.

ATHLETICS GAIN IN FRIDAY GAMES

Two Triple Steals Used in Tilt With Cleveland—Senators Beaten.

At the rate the Philadelphia Athletics are pulling away from the rest of the American league pack and the spaces between the lower positions in the standing are widening, it won't be long before the only interesting struggle left is the fight between Boston and St. Louis to keep out of last place.

Yesterday the Mackmen surprised the Cleveland infield with a pair of triple steals and worked them to add a couple of runs to their total. In addition to this strategy, the A's made 12 hits, three of them home runs and received ten bases on balls to win by a 14 to 1 score. It was their eleventh victory in 14 games of the current western tour.

Washington Defeated
Washington dropped further back as the Chicago White Sox came along fast in the closing innings and pitted out a 6 to 5 victory in the ninth. The Senators have suffered almost as many reverses as the Athletics have scored triumphs, losing 11 games and winning 7 against western opposition.

The third place New York Yankees kept pace with the league leaders, also game behind them, by taking advantage of Detroit's seven errors to win a 14 to 7 decision. Lou Gehrig got his 20th home run.

Down where the league's real struggle is going on, the St. Louis Browns came out on top by a 6 to 3 score and kept the Boston Red Sox in the cellar. Boston, trying to move into fourth place, could not cope with George Blaeholder's six hit pitching and Goose Goslin's hitting. Goslin drove in four runs with a homer, double and a single.

Leaders Win
Brooklyn and Chicago, who continue to keep the national league race interesting, each won another game without trouble yesterday and are separated by a half game, Brooklyn leading.

The Robins pounded Lucas hard in three innings and accumulated enough runs to down Cincinnati 7 to 2 while Moss and Heimach, the latter making his first appearance for Brooklyn, held the Red matters in check.

Chicago pounded Beige and Willoughby for 16 hits and again defeated the Phillies, 9 to 6 this time. Cleveland, trying to move into third place, pitched to seven hits while New York gained a 3 to 1 victory. "Doc" Williams' Sauer stopped his former mates, with nine hits and Boston defeated the Cards, 5 to 4.

MARANVILLE'S DAY OBSERVED; RECEIVES CAR

BOSTON, July 26 (AP)—The 37-year-old Peter Pan of baseball, Rabbit Maranville, grizzled veteran of 18 campaigns of shortstop play, today had his "day."

An automobile, a chest of silver, a picture and other gifts awaited his appearance at the Braves-Cardinals doubleheader. Even the knote-hole gang and the peanut vendors had gifts for him.

Fans from far and wide in New England joined in planning the day. The biggest advance sale Braves field ever had proved the popularity of "the Springfield Kid," who ranks with Babe Ruth in popularity in the annals of Boston big league baseball.

Faced Famous Combination
In his youthful days in 1912, he came to the Braves from New Bedford. His first game was against the Cubs, with Evers, Tinker and Chance in the opposition. The Rabbit handled 12 chances without a slipup.

Sixteen years ago this month, the Braves were in the cellar—and October were world champions. The Rabbit was a mainstay in the infield. Hank Gowdy, catcher, the only other player of the team still with the Braves, forsakes coaching duties rarely for action on the field.

The Rabbit's meanderings took him into the navy for a brief stay and to the Pirates, the Cubs, the Dodgers, the Cardinals, and into the international league. On the way out of baseball in 1927, he came back and was an outstanding performer for the Cardinals against the Yankees in the 1928 world series.

He returned to his old home baseball town last year, and the scenes of youthful triumphs apparently bettered his play. Manager Bill McKelchie says the improved 50 per cent since 1928, when both were in St. Louis. Last week he hit a home run, his first in two years.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 26 (AP)—Carl Mays, righthanded pitcher of the Portland Beavers, has been indefinitely suspended without salary, Thomas L. Turner, president, announced today. This action follows a clubhouse fist fight between the ex-major leaguer and John Walters, another Beaver pitcher, two days ago.

Mays, it was said, suffered a broken nose and rib fractures. He has been confined to his home since the encounter. Walters has a swollen jaw, split lip and assorted bruises.

Turner said the suspension will not be lifted until Mays reports in condition to pitch.

The "submarine ball" expert is said to be one of the highest paid players on the coast. He signed with Portland last winter having been made a free agent by the New York Giants.

There isn't much mystery about the fight of the Brooklyn Robins pennantward when the features of this remarkable collection of baseball ivory are examined.

It may be traced chiefly to the improvement in two vital positions—shortstop, where Glenn Wright has returned to his most brilliant form; behind the bat, where Al Lopez has

bobbed up as the finest young receiver to break in since Mickey Cochran joined the A's.

There are a number of other reasons, not the least of which is that Your Uncle Wilbert Robinson knows how to get more and better pitching out of any given set of salary wings than any manager in the game. Note, for example, Babe Phelps and Adolfo Luque.

Wright has "made" the infield and his cleanup hitting has never been more in evidence. Outside of Al Simmons and Babe Ruth, there isn't a more dangerous man at the plate in a pinch than the Robins shortstop.

The acquisition of two fine young infield reserves in Slade and Finn, the latter fast becoming a regular at the keystone bag, has been another factor in Brooklyn's favor.

Moreover, there is a slugging outfield featuring the irreplaceable Babe Herman, who may be hoisted one moment as he barely misses being beaned by a fly ball, wildly cheered the next as he drives the ball out of the park.

Driving Hazards Stressed by Judge

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—A traffic school where graduation doesn't mean diplomas, but where attendance and punctuality are nearly perfect is operated here and has 1700 "alumni."

It is directed by Judge Levi M. Hall, who believes that education rather than jail sentences and fines will improve driving, and that age more caution, and reduce the accident rate.

Instead of sending first and minor offenders to routine punishment, he suspends sentences and then "re-sentences" them to the school. There they are instructed in traffic laws, accident hazards, first aid, and are re-taught how to operate a motor vehicle. Those who "play hockey" find their original sentences levied. A "class" of 551 was graduated recently.
