## IMPLEMENTS OF "IRON AGE" DUG UP IN PHILIPPINES

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP)—The wide spread of mankind at the dawn of the "iron age" is indicated in a report to the American Philosophical Association. Professor Deane says Prof. H. Otley Bayer of the University of the Philippines has unearthed in the islands well known implements of the iron age.  
They are knives, axes, daggers and spear-points, and glass ornaments which accompanied the articles.  
Beneath the iron age strata Professor Bayer has found implements of the late stone age, and some indications of early iron age men who date back perhaps 10,000 years.


