Interest Remains High In Churches Despite Vacation

Many Interesting Sermons and Programs Prepared for Sunday in House of Worship.

Although the churches are now entering the final one of the three warm summer months, and the vacation season is at its height, interest in Sunday services continue very good, the various pastors say.

A number of interesting sermons and programs have been announced for Sunday in La Grande. They follow:
First M. E. Church
Church school at 9:45 o'clock under the direction of Supt. E. S. Burnett, opens the services Sunday at the First Methodist Episcopal church. The 11 o'clock morning worship service will include choir music and a solo by Leslie Davies, who was tenor soloist for one of the large Portland churches last winter. The sermon theme is "Loyalty and Love." Epworth League meets at 7 p. m. and popular evening services will be held at 8 p. m. with a brief service by the pastor.

Holy Communion will be held at St. Peter's Episcopal church Sunday

 pected from the same district. The present movement has been the biggest in the history of the local plant, stated Mr. Bogie. In addition to the above, there has been quite a run of frozen strawberries, raspberries, and gooseberries, these put up in 50-gallon drums, coming from Yakima, Portland, and some from Seattle. These are hauled by special service and mostly go to New York.
 The next movement of size, and it is the largest of any handled by the local plant, here will be apples, when the peak shipment is on with these, 100 or 150 carloads a day are expected. The local plant not only receives all shipments going through here on the U. P. railroad, but with the Grande Ronde production, the cars are initially iced before being sent to Union for loading.
 The North Powder plant also ices cars for the butter shipments out of Baker, and now with the big cooperative plant there in addition to the private production, about three carloads a week are being handled. Most of the butter goes to California markets, where it is sold and consumed.—North Powder News.
