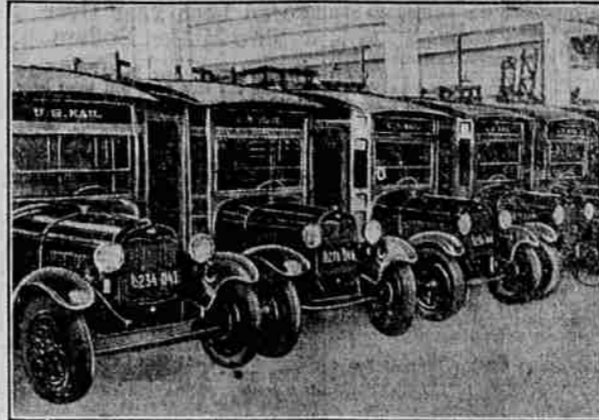

Larger Engine Announced For Chrysler "70"

Increased power and improved performance of all Chrysler "70" models has been effected with the announcement by the Chrysler Sales Corporation that the 93-horsepower engine used in the "70" models is now offered as standard equipment in all cars of the "70" series. The change to the larger engine has been made at no increase in retail price, and provides the motorist with the moderate price field with mechanical equipment heretofore associated only with cars in the \$2,000 class.

Models available in the "70" series include the Royal sedan, brougham, Royal coupe, business coupe, convertible coupe, and roadster. The price range is from \$1345 to \$1545 at the factory.

The power plant of the "70" models now has a bore of 3 3/8 inches, a stroke of 5 inches and a displacement of 268.4 cubic inches. Compression ratio is 5 to 1. Seven bearings, having a total area of 78 square inches, support the counterweighted crankshaft.

Money Sharks Prey On Tourists in Italy NAPLES, 7/27—Many American tourists are complaining of Italian exchange sharks who give them a scanty number of lire in return for dollars.

These sharks operate mostly in small offices. To an American presenting a ten-dollar bill or travel

check he offers 180 lire instead of the 190 or a little more that should be paid. Thus, on an exchange of \$10, he makes between 55 and 60 cents.

If the American protests, the exchange broker will go up to 182 lire, but his profit on the simple transaction is still large. In cashing a \$100 travel check he makes \$5.

Tourists receive the full market rate only by going to American or English tourist agencies or branches of American or English banks, or the big recognized Italian banking houses. They should get 19 lire for a dollar.

TRAFFIC COPS TO PAINT CARS BLACK, WHITE SALEM, Ore., Aug. 2 (AP)—Motorists will know when the cops are coming by instructions given by Secretary of State Hoot to T. A. Raffet, chief state traffic inspector, are carried out. Orders are to paint the automobiles and motorcycles of the traffic department a distinctive color. For automobiles, Hoot suggests that bodies be painted white and tops black, and he suggests that motorcycles be painted white. The state traffic insignia will be painted on the vehicles also. Hoot says several states have adopted this regulation. Two cars in original colors will be retained for secret operation.

Non-Shatter Glass Used on Navy Ships The safety features of shatter-proof glass, such as is used in the windshields of Ford cars, have been recognized by the navy department and, according to a report of the bureau of construction and repair, its use in the windows of pilot houses and fire control stations of naval vessels has been an important factor in preventing accidents.

"On the bridges of navy destroyers, the use of non-scatterable glass has saved personnel from injury due to the impact of heavy seas," the report says. "On the larger fighting vessels, the use of this glass has prevented injury from flying glass broken by the shock of heavy gun fire."

The shatter-proof glass in windshields of Ford cars is made of two pieces of thin, selected, ground and polished glass, coated with chemicals to form a cement coating. A layer of pyroxylin plastic is introduced between the two coated sheets and they are united to form a single sheet of laminated glass by means of heat and pressure. The laminated sheet is then sealed at all edges to prevent the action of air and moisture on the pyroxylin plastic and chemicals.

When broken, each small particle of glass adheres firmly to the pyroxylin plastic internal layer with the result that there is no flying glass. Numerous letters received by the Ford Motor company testify to the effectiveness of the shatterproof windshield in saving lives and preventing serious injury.
