Menus Of The Day

PEAR CHIP BLENDS WITH FISH
Menu for Dinner
Tuna Loaf Escalloped Potatoes
Biscuit Baked Tomatoes
Biscuit Pear Chip
Head Lettuce and French Dressing
Dutch Apple Cake
Coffee

Tuna Loaf, serving 6 (Suitable for picnic)
1 1/2 cups tuna.
1 cup soft bread crumbs.
2 eggs.
3 tablespoons chopped celery.
2 tablespoons chopped parsley.
2 tablespoons chopped green peppers.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1/2 teaspoon pepper.
1 cup milk.
3 tablespoons butter, melted.
Mix ingredients and pour into buttered loaf pan. Bake 35 minutes in moderately slow oven. Unmold carefully and surround with baked tomatoes. Garnish with parsley.

(Preserves for winter use)
8 peaches, pears.
4 lemons.
10 cups sugar.
1/2 ounce ginger root.
1 cup water.

Wash and peel the pears. Cut in halves and remove cores. Wash and slice lemons very thin. Remove all seeds. Mix pears, lemon slices, water and sugar. Let stand 30 minutes. Boil gently 30 minutes. Add ginger root. Let stand overnight. Boil 4 minutes. Pour into sterilized jars and seal.

Dutch Apple Cake
2 cups flour.
4 teaspoons baking powder.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
4 tablespoons sugar.
4 tablespoons fat.
1 egg.
1 cup milk.
Mix the flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Cut in fat with knife. Add egg and milk. Pour to thickness of 1 1/2 inches in a greased pan. Add the apple mixture.
Bake 20 minutes in moderate oven.
Serve warm or cold. Cut in squares.

Homeless Church In Glencoe, Illinois

GLENCOE, Ill., Aug. 6 (AP) — The Negro Baptist church of Glencoe is being moved, nobody knows where. The church has been standing on property owned by the Glencoe park commission. Gave \$96,750.00 To Davis-Brown Chest

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6 (AP)—Walter A. Bonitz, Pittsburgh brick manufacturer, told the senate campaign funds committee Tuesday that he gave \$96,750 to the Davis-Brown campaign chest in the May Pennsylvania republican primary. Bonitz said neither Secretary Davis who won the senatorial nomination, nor Francis Siskunk Brown, one of the gubernatorial candidates, solicited any money from him. He denied he made the contribution in return for state brick contracts and said he had been solicited since the primary to help wipe out a deficit but refused to give any more money.

Says Farmer Is Willing To Cut Wheat Acreage

WASHINGTON (AP)—The American wheat farmer, says Chairman Legge of the farm board, is through with fantastic visions of "relief" and is ready to shoulder his share of responsibility in effecting economic adjustment.

This impression, he says, was gained by personal contact with farmers during his tour of the winter wheat belt.

As proof of the farmer's attitude, the chairman says acreage reduction has been pledged in all states of the winter wheat belt where farmers, following the lead of those in the spring wheat region, already are bringing the 1931 acreage more nearly in line with the 10-year prospective demand for wheat.

It is not the farmer, Legge says, who talks about the board taking vast quantities of wheat and dumping it in the ocean or giving it to China or selling it at a loss to European countries merely for the sake of getting it out of this country.

The chairman says the board has discussed at length the probability of selling American wheat to the Chinese national government on a deferred payment plan and has given up the idea.

It has concluded that China offers no promising prospects as an outlet for American wheat.

Nulling the theory that the board might "give" surplus wheat to China, Legge says the "board is not in the gift business."

Anti-dumping laws in foreign countries, he says, would prevent the operation of any kind of plan to sell wheat abroad cheaper than it sells on the American markets.

Health Talks

TUBERCULOSIS
Tuberculosis is one of the oldest plagues afflicting mankind. Its antiquity is gruesomely attested to by an Egyptian mummy, showing the unmistakable evidence of having suffered during life from the "great white plague."

Tuberculosis, known by its ancient name "phthisis" is mentioned in the writings of ancient physicians, and not a few among these appreciated the nature of the malady and prescribed for its treatment.

Though so ancient a disease, tuberculosis still is among the leading causes of death and, though based on the number of persons it kills it ranks fourth in the series, it ranks first as a destroyer of life in the middle age groups.

Few diseases so deeply affect the community as does tuberculosis. Tuberculosis, in the vast majority of cases, is a chronic disease. It seldom kills outright. Generally it wastes the patient slowly.

During the period of his affliction the patient usually is a constant source of danger to himself and to those about him. Those living in intimate contact with the sufferer, and particularly the young, are especially apt to become infected.

In this sense tuberculosis is a familial disease. It runs in families not because it is hereditary, but because of the special liability to infection that goes with the intimacy of family life.

The cost of the treatment that tuberculosis requires lays a heavy burden upon the family and upon society. As the largest number of deaths from tuberculosis take place between the age of 25 to 45, society loses through tuberculosis a large number of its most productive members.
