Heavy Feeding Of Wheat in All Parts of Belt

CHICAGO, Aug. 6 (AP)—Heavy feeding of wheat in all parts of the corn belt was reported yesterday to the farmers' national grain corporation by directors and members throughout the area in close touch with crop conditions.

The corporation issued a statement saying it had been estimated the total of wheat fed to livestock would reach from 75 to 100 million bushels of prevailing relationships between corn and wheat prices continued.

The statement said the Kansas state agricultural college had estimated that in the hard winter wheat belt alone from 25 to 30 million bushels of wheat would be fed.

Throughout the spring wheat area, the statement said, more wheat and rye than ever before would be assigned to livestock troughs. Stockmen in the northwest were reported to have contracted for grain hay while other grain was cut for feed reserves.

In Western Kansas feeding of wheat was reported to be general. In Oklahoma "everybody who has anything to feed wheat is feeding it." Corn in that state was reported dried so badly as to be worthless even for fodder.

Reports to the corporation from Indiana and Illinois said that numerous farmers were withholding wheat from the market, with the probability that a large part of it would be fed depending on the extent of damage to the corn crop.

Numerous sections of Missouri and Nebraska reported similar circumstances, while in Northern Colorado the statement said wheat was left standing in the fields.

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To Shoot Rockets 75 Miles Into Sky

NEW YORK, Aug. 6 (AP)—Experiment in shooting rockets to extreme altitudes, financed by Daniel Guggenheim, will be carried on by Prof. Robert H. Goddard of Clark University, Worcester, Mass., at Roswell, N. M. That site, selected because of favorable atmospheric conditions.

Prof. Goddard has been conducting rocket experiments since 1912 with the aid of the Smithsonian Institution, Clark University and the Carnegie Institute. Guggenheim recently made a grant to permit further work.

At Roswell, small rockets will be sent up first and finally one capable of ascending from 50 to 75 miles will be sent up by gas propulsion and with parachutes to regulate the speed of the return to earth. The rockets will carry thermometers, barometers, electrical measuring apparatus, air traps to collect samples of air at various altitudes and other instruments.

Pending completion of preparatory work it cannot be anticipated when the work at Roswell will begin.

Fresh Extras In Eggs Advance To 27 Cents Today

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 6 (AP)—Fresh extras in eggs advanced 10 to 27c today but no changes in other grades were announced by the Pacific Co-operative Poultry Producers. Top grades are reported in wide demand.

The butter market was firm with trade moderate and receipts light. Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says:

Trading on the wholesale fruit and vegetable market is rather quiet this week, with generally low price-levels. Watermelons show the greatest activity, comprising 1/3 of the total carload volume of unloads at present.

Tomatoes from The Dalles are now at their season's peak, and are holding at former levels than during last year's peak. Receipts from The Dalles are much lighter than last year, possibly due to a greater portion of the crop moving seaward by rail.

With the northwestern cantaloupe season approaching, much interest is felt in competition from Colorado. First loadings from that state are expected today or tomorrow, with considerable volume moving by the end of this week. Colorado's peak shipments are expected to reach 100 cars daily, in the last week of August.

California peaches have apparently reached their lowest price levels of the season. Growers and shippers are allowing the surplus production to remain unharvested, rather than causing market glut with extremely heavy shipments.

Alfalfa Prices In Oregon About Same This Week

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6—Alfalfa markets continued steady to somewhat stronger during the week ending August 5. This strength was due more to a persistent holding tendency on the part of the growers than to any material increase in demand for hay, according to the weekly alfalfa review of the United States bureau of agricultural economics. Demand continued to be considerably restricted by poor credit conditions, low prices for dairy products and cheap feed grains, other than corn.

Receipts at Kansas City, although slightly larger than for the previous week, were somewhat below requirements and prices advanced \$1.30 to \$2.50 per ton. Dairyman and shippers offered the best quality and some orders for dairy quality of hay remained unfilled. Due to the light offerings of that quality of hay, however, trade reports indicate that orders were somewhat below expectations. Demand was generally restricted by low prices for other farm products.

San Francisco market was steady to slightly strong and with demand largely from shippers to fill previous orders from eastern markets. Local demand was light and for heavy shipment. Trading and movement were still below normal, largely as a result of poor demand from dairymen. Meal millers report some improvement in demand for meal, on the Atlantic seaboard, although local inquiry continued dull. The fourth cutting of alfalfa progressed under ideal conditions in all sections and the quality and yield were reported very satisfactory. A large part of this cutting was being shipped out of the Sacramento and San Joaquin valleys but was generally being stacked in the delta.

Quotations remained about unchanged at Portland with U. S. No. 1 alfalfa quoted at \$17.00 per ton. The first cutting in the Yakima valley sold at \$14.00 and the second at \$13.00 per ton. Pastures in that section were reported fairly good but are drying up rapidly.
