Straining to establish a lead that can stand the strain of slumps and battle with chief contenders yet to come, the Robins scored a 7 to 4 conquest over Pittsburgh in the opening of the Pirate series yesterday, while the St. Louis Cardinals rode to split the Chicago Cubs and add to the lead of the Robins, now 3 1/2 games in front of the league leading champions of 1929.

100 MEN BATTLE FOREST FLAMES

Forestry officials said the fire was burning on the side of a steep hill and they were experiencing difficulty in lifting water with pumps to the level. Because of especially hazardous forest-fire conditions on certain particular areas, a total of 875,889 acres of national forest land in Oregon and Washington have been closed this summer, according to figures just issued by the regional forester, Portland, Oregon.

Travelers planning to visit any of the national forests during the fire season should call on the local supervisor or ranger to learn what areas have been closed. Forest officials point out that the closing orders are backed by federal regulations and will be rigidly enforced.
