Chats With Parents

Practical Ethics
By Alice Judson Peck

Most of us try earnestly to train our children to our own highest standards of conduct. Consideration for others, generosity, scrupulous fairness, honesty—these are some of the concepts which set the keynote of our ideal attitudes toward them, and constitute the language of the morality that we try to teach them.

But the moment the child goes out to play away from the watchful eyes of mother or nursemaid he must learn to make adjustments to an entirely new set of standards. The morality of children toward each other is rough and ready, conspicuously lacking in sympathy and anything but the crudest sort of justice.

A child who is trying literally to be as good as he has been taught to be at home is treated by other children either as a prig and an outsider or as a fit prey for exploitation. A child simply cannot afford to be too nice to his playmates.

It is easy to teach a child the necessary difference between home ideals and the working morality of the playground.

At home with father and mother, he may live up to the highest standards and expect to be treated in accordance with them. But in playing with other children he must learn that the main thing is to get along and to have a good time.

A child readily understands these different situations and adjusts himself to what seem to us conflicting ideas of conduct.

Without doing much thinking he learns to be as decent to his playmates as he can be, and still hold his own and keep their respect.

Fried Chicken, Serving 6
2 chickens (2 1/2-3 pounds)

1/2 cup flour
6 tablespoons fat
3 tablespoons butter
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1-3 cup boiling water.

Wash and cut chickens into serving pieces. Dip in flour. Heat fat in frying pan, add the chicken and brown well on all sides. Add butter and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Cover with lid and cook slowly half an hour. Add water and cook slowly 20 minutes.

Browned Gravy
5 tablespoons chicken drippings
6 tablespoons flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 cup water
1 1/2 cups milk
2 tablespoons chopped parsley

Remove the chicken from frying pan and mix flour with the drippings.

Plants, Cook slowly and stir constantly until flour has browned. Add rest of ingredients and cook slowly.

Peach Dumplings
2 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon baking powder
2-3 cup lard
2 tablespoons cold water

Mix the flour, salt and baking powder. Cut in fat with knife. Mixing with knife, add cold water. When stiff dough forms, divide into 6 parts and roll out each until very thin. Add portions of the peach mixture.

Peach Mixture
6 large peaches, peeled
2-3 cup sugar
1 teaspoon cinnamon
3 tablespoons butter

Cut peaches in halves and place 2 halves of each piece of dough, add portions of rest of ingredients. Bring edges of dough over the peach mixture and pinch in place. Make holes on tops with tines of a fork. Fit into buttered baking pan and add sugar made of 2 cups of water which have boiled 4 minutes with 1 1/2 cups of sugar. Bake 35 minutes. Baste frequently.
