DETROIT, Aug. 9.—American built automobiles continue to dominate stock car endurance, reliability and speed tests over long and short distances in European competition. The Hudson Motor Car company, entering Hudson and Essex cars, alone has won many famous trophies during the past year, and against the largest fields ever attracted in these events.

Among these trophies are the Ahsaid trophy, premier award in the Tour de France, which Hudson won for the second successive year this June; the Gold Medal, also of the Tour de France; the Spido and Dunlop trophies offered by the French Automobile club to the two leading cars manufactured by the same company. Hudson and Essex won these three Hudson great trophies finished equal first to win the City of War trophy, the Silver cup, the Bronze cup, the Automobile Club cup and a cup offered by an oil company, in addition to three gold

badges. This was in the Polish International reliability tour. Essex still holds the "Circuit of the Ports" awards, having won first place in the "Circuit of the Ports" test staged by the Motor club of Spain.

All of these tests are the principal reliability tests of their respective countries, the equivalent of the United States Indianapolis speedway classic. In each event the Hudson and Essex cars were entered they finished in first place, except when an Essex was entered in the same test as a Hudson and the Essex placed second to the Hudson. All the awards are made to the cars, finished with the smallest number of penalties, and in each case the Hudson and Essex cars finished without a single penalty.

TRADE HEAVY FOR SATURDAY IN EXCHANGE

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—Renewal of short selling in the last fifteen minutes of today's stock market broke prices of leading shares \$1 to \$2 below Friday's close after a covering movement had eliminated an earlier decline of \$1 to \$2.

Prices declined on a relatively larger volume of trading during the first half of the two hour session as further selling came into the market, but the bears soon began to cover actively and numerous shares showed small net gains.

The technical rally failed to hold, however, and the market turned heavy again in the late dealings.

United States Steel closed \$1.50 lower and there were losses of \$2 to \$3 in Vanadium, Columbian Carbon, Houston Oil, New York Central, North American, Warner Brothers pictures, J. I. Case, Auburn auto and United Aircraft.

American Telephone, one of Friday's conspicuously weak issues, was firm, closing \$3.12 higher. Union Pacific, Southern Railway, Foster Wheeler, and American Water Works gained \$1 to \$2.

Total sales were 1,508,400 shares, the largest for a Saturday since late in June.

Seven Miners Slain By Falling Timbers

POTTSVILLE, Pa., Aug. 9.—Caught in a fall of timbers and debris in the Gilberton colliery of the Philadelphia and Reading Coal and Iron company last night, seven miners were killed and 16 others injured.

Three of those who escaped with their lives were injured so severely that they may not recover, hospital physicians said today.

Flour Advances 20 Cents; Butter Market Weaker

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 9.—Flour: patents and pastry flours have advanced another 20c, according to quotations of the Sperry Flour company. Heavier receipts and lighter demand imparted a weaker tone to the butter market. The opinion prevails that the recent advances have been too rapid.

The egg market was fairly steady, with top grades bringing full quotations.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the U. S. department of agriculture says: The peach market is showing a firmer undertone, in spite of heavy truckloadings at Portland. California shippers are advancing their prices a trifle and shippers are comparatively light. Shipments from Yakima will not move in volume for at least two weeks yet, due to crop failure in the lower Yakima valley.

New-crop onions from the Sherwood, Oregon, district are expected next week. Local potatoes are in liberal supply, prohibiting sale of many Washington potatoes. Yakima shippers have advanced their prices a bit to \$1.00 per cwt. plug bags, for fall delivery of combination grade Netted Gems. San Francisco is taking several cars of Yakima potatoes this week.

Walla Walla tomatoes continue to bring a substantial premium over stock from The Dalles. The Dalles tomatoes declined 5-10c per box.

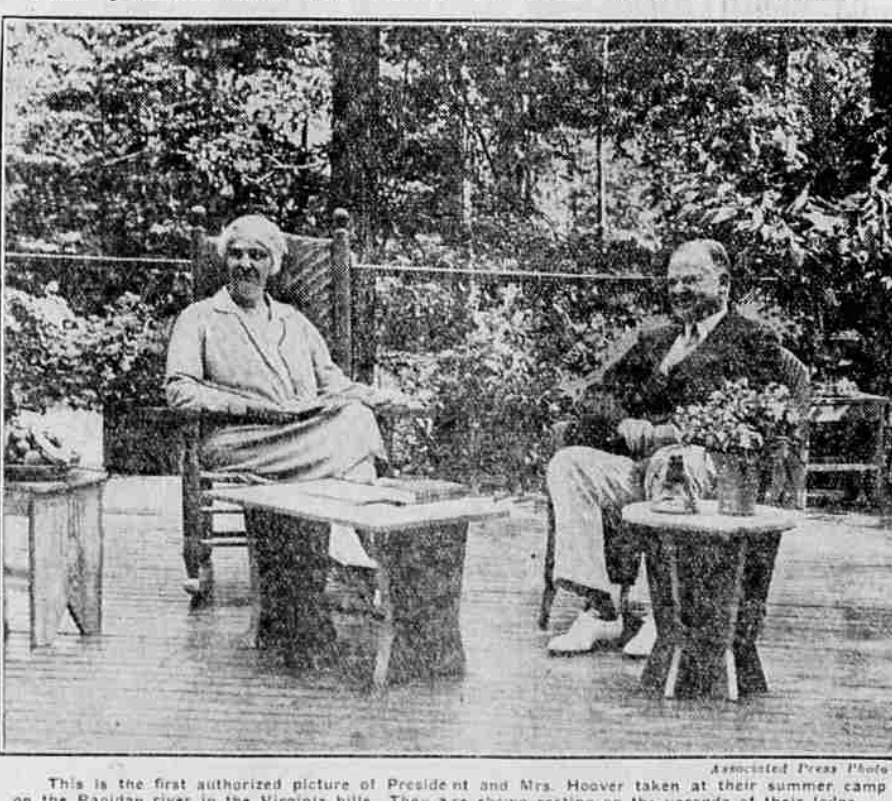

Adjustment Base One Feature Of New Ford Cars

Keeping a car in first class condition is much easier today than it was even a few years ago and consequently the pleasure of motoring has been increased while the cost of maintenance has been reduced.

In the days when "Get Out and Get Under" was a popular song, the motorist had to be something of a mechanic for service stations were few and mechanical parts were complicated. Adjusting a carburetor required skill and a kit of tools and changing a tire was hard work.

Today, however, engineering skill has so simplified parts that in a car like the Ford adjustments may be made by anyone in a few minutes. Every part of the Ford has been designed with the utmost simplicity.

The mixture in the carburetor, for instance, is controlled by a knob on the dash. Without leaving the seat, the driver can enrich the mixture or thin it for long driving by a simple turn of the knob.

Houdaille shock absorbers can be regulated by the turn of a needle valve on each—the work of a few minutes for the entire car. Changing a tire on the drop center rim is quite simple compared with what the job required a few years ago.

Even such things as filling the radiator and attending to the battery have been made simpler. The threaded radiator cap that had to be screwed on and off has given away to one that locks with a twist of the wrist. Instead of lifting up the floor board to get to the battery, one has but to remove a small plate in the floor.

The adjustable driver's seat was a great convenience when it was first introduced, but some of the adjustment devices were too complicated for the woman driver to operate. Now, however, the seat adjustment has been so simplified in the closed model Fords, such as the coupe, town sedan, etc., that one can regulate it with the ease of winding a clock. The adjustment is made by turning an inconspicuous knob in front of the seat and this can be done without the driver leaving the car.

Explains Reason For Orders To Repaint Autos

SALZM, Ore., Aug. 9.—It is not the desire of Secretary of State Hal Hoss, ex-officio head of the state traffic department, or of T. A. Rafferty, chief state traffic inspector, that officers in the employ of the traffic department shall "sneak up" on motorists in the hopes of multiplying the number of arrests for traffic violations.

That is one reason why automobiles and motorcycles used by the department are to be painted distinctive colors. When this is done the presence of officers on the roads may be more easily detected by motorists, with the result that regulations may be complied with without personal contact between officer and traveler.

From Secretary Hoss the order has gone to Chief Rafferty to have the automobiles of the traffic department painted with white bodies and black tops, also with the insignia of the department stamped on doors. Motorcycles are to be painted all white.

Distinctive Colors
Distinctive colors for traffic cars and cycles have been adopted in a number of other states, Secretary Hoss said and the policy is a success.

The Oregon traffic department has a fleet of 44 autos and 19 motorcycles. The cycles are used for light, quick work and almost entirely on paved highways. Experience has proved that motorcycles are not practical on any unpaved road and it has been found that the maintenance cost of the automobiles, many of them of the small and cheaper makes, is not much more than the expense of keeping up the cycles. Another advantage over cycles is that the automobiles protect the officers from weather and other hazards.

The number of cars owned by the department, Chief Rafferty said, is necessary because of the various duties of the officers. Their service is not confined entirely to traffic. They travel the byways and country roads of the state, correcting errors of license applications, mistakes in title registrations and other things that sometimes cannot be done by mail. It is not known just how soon the cars will all appear in their new dress. The paint has to be done with a minimum loss of men on duty.
