Vegetable Salad, in Gelatin
1 package lemon flavored gelatin
mixture
1 2-3 cups boiling water
3 tablespoons vinegar
3 tablespoons sugar
1 1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup chopped cabbage
1 cup chopped raw carrots
1/2 cup diced cucumbers
2 tablespoons pimientos
Four boiling water over gelatin mixture. Stir well. Add vinegar, sugar and salt. Cool. Add rest of ingredients. Pour into mold. Chill.

1 cup butter
2 cups sugar
4 eggs
1 cup milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 teaspoon lemon extract
1/4 teaspoon salt
3 cups flour (pastry)
3 teaspoons baking powder
Cream butter until soft. Add sugar, beat until creamy. Add other ingredients, beat 3 minutes. Pour into 3 layer cake pans fitted with waxed paper. Bake 25 minutes in moderate oven. Cool and frost.
3 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
1 cup water
3 egg whites, stiffly beaten.
2-3 cup coconut
Mix sugar, cream of tartar and water. Cook slowly without stirring, until thread forms when portion is slowly poured from spoon. Pour into beaten egg whites. Beat until frosting is cold. Add rest of ingredients.
(Chocolate Pudding)
(1 egg yolk)
2-3 cup sugar
4 tablespoons salt
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 squares chocolate, melted.
2 1/2 cups milk
3 egg yolks
1 tablespoon butter
1 teaspoon vanilla
Blend sugar, flour and salt. Add chocolate, milk and egg yolks. Cook in double boiler until thick and creamy. Stir frequently. Add rest of ingredients, mix well, pour into glass dish. Cool and chill.

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Peak of Grain Hauling Reached At Elgin, Oregon

ELGIN, Ore. (Special)—The mill reports a peak of the grain hauling as being reached this week. It is thought. On Wednesday 6,000 bushels were brought in. It is thought an equal amount would probably be stored in the warehouse, making from 10,000 to 12,000 bushels received during the day.

At his summer home at Eagle River, Wis., Comiskey celebrated his seventy-first birthday with his son, J. Louis Comiskey, the latter's wife and their two children, hopeful his youthful Chicago White Sox would give him a victory over the world champion Philadelphia Athletics at Philadelphia.

Imbler will have 15 head, one pen of ten yearlings and one pen of five yearlings and two-year-olds. Harry Avery will have 15 head, a pen of five and one of ten yearlings. Hugh Huron of Brooks Lane will have three lots, a pen with one yearling, one with five and one with nine. Earl Reynolds will have ten yearlings. From Wallawa county, A. W. Eggleston of Enterprise, W. E. Boner of Joseph and Albert Varner of Enterprise will have lots of sales.

The big sale will also attract many buyers from the valley who are anxious to secure new and better stock. There will be lots of ewes in this year's sale also.

ed, but the apples are large for this season is about two weeks earlier than last year since trees are being "propped" the last week in July. The fruit seems remarkably clean.

"Pears—A good crop is in sight. Traces are well loaded and fruit is larger than three weeks later a year ago."

"Prunes—There was a heavy drop during July due to extreme heat. The prunes will be good sized, however. Shipments will probably start a week to ten days ahead of last year. If the hot weather continues into the first two weeks of August, the crop will be further reduced, in which case shipments will run around 1200 to 1300 cars.

"Peaches are a very short crop due to low winter temperatures. About the only source of supply will be the Mesa orchards in Adams county and the Baker orchard across the line at Home, Oregon.

14 Cars Of Lambs Out From Wallawa

Many lambs are going to market from this county at the present time. Sunday's freight took 14 cars of lambs out of several of the cars are said to have gone to the Chicago markets and others to Omaha. McPetridge of Joseph creek was the largest shipper of lambs for the last of the week, having loaded 800 of his lambs which averaged 82 pounds each. He has a few hundred smaller lambs which were also brought off the range and will be held overnight pasture for a few weeks before shipping. It is expected that lamb shipments will be quite heavy from this county for a number of weeks yet as many of the larger bands are still being held on the mountain ranges, and some of the lambs will not be brought out for shipment until toward the middle of September. The stock marketing association of this county has been an active shipper of lambs during the past few weeks, the most of the lambs marketed in this manner were of small lots and several cars have been sent to the Omaha market. Returns have not been received as yet from the last shipment and growers who sent lambs are anxious to receive their returns and know what they will get for their lambs. Some of the earlier shipments handled through the association are said to have netted local growers about \$7.35 per hundred. Some weekly shipments of cattle and hogs are going from this county at this time. Cattle have become very fat where they have been summered on good ranges. It is likely that hog shipments will be lighter from this community during the next month or six weeks because of the fact that the greater portion of the fall and winter pigs have been fattened out at this time and many of the spring pigs will be run in the stubble for some time before they are put up for fattening.

Harvesting of the grain crops in the irrigated areas of this county is getting quite well under way at this time.

The hot dry weather has caused barley on the irrigated fields to ripen up quite rapidly and much of it is being bound at this time. The most of the spring wheat in the valley has been cut at this time and some threshing is starting at some of the valley farms at this time.

Second crop alfalfa are making an excellent growth where plenty of irrigation water is available and some of it will be ready for cutting toward the latter part of this month.

A fairly large part of the threshing of winter wheat in this county of the valley has been done during the past ten days. Stationary threshing was the first to start and a number of small machines have been busy threshing out several large crops in the dry farming areas which were cut with binders. Reports of yields from all farms appear to be quite good, with the average yield running better than 25 bushels per acre. A number of combines are now busy cutting at a number of the farms in the hills. Oscar Maxwell who started his machine Wednesday of last week recently finished cutting 40 acres of heavy grain for Meek brothers and is now cutting on his own grain at the U. G. Couch farm.

Winter wheat of summer fallow land in this section will run near 30 bushels per acre. This is several bushels higher than the average yield for a number of years. The long continued dry spell has been very severe on spring sown grain on dry land, much of this grain will be very short and hard to harvest and no one is expecting very heavy yields.

A number of tractors and combine munity have been busy during the past week or two hauling grain to the warehouses here and at Evans. Hauling charges are considerably lower this season and the greater part of the farmers feel that they are getting off cheaper by having their wheat put in with trucks than where they loaded up for hauling over surfaced roads. Charles Dodson and Reid McClain have been busy hauling wheat for Ed Bell from the C. A. Hunter farm in the hills. Mr. Bell is nearly finished with his own threshing and expects to thresh for R. J. Conner and a few others in the Whiskey creek and Dry creek sections.
