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CHICAGO WALLOPS BROOKLYN 5 TO 1

Final Game of Series Will be Played in National League Today.

By Hugh S. Fullerton Jr. (Associated Press Sports Writer) Unless today's final clash of the "decisive" series between Brooklyn and Chicago finally brings something like a decision, it looks as if their

race for the National League pennant might continue indefinitely, or at least until they meet again in September. Despite the big margin they held over the Robins in their season's play, the Cubs have not been able to get far ahead in the three games of their current series. Chicago has won two clashes and went one full game ahead yesterday as Pat Malone pitched a fine game for a 5 to 1 Cub triumph. But still the big advantage for the Bruins is that the difference in the losing column where Brooklyn is two games to the bad. The future schedules show little possibility of a "break" for either team. The Cubs, held in check to some degree through the second game, were

completely superior yesterday as Malone stopped the thunder of Brooklyn's big bats. Bill Clark, Brooklyn's southpaw ace, lasted less than two innings and Clue Duddy could not check the run slugging until the damage had been done. With four teams kept idle by rain and wet grounds, the National league as a whole made little progress yesterday. The St. Louis Cardinals and Boston Braves divided a close double header. Sox's Seibold lost a tough struggle in the first game as the Cards put on a two-run rally in the ninth to win, 4 to 3. In the second, old Tom Zachary outlasted Burleigh Grimes and held St. Louis to six hits while the Braves pulled out a 3 to 2 win.

Wins 20th Victory
 Three pitchers, Wes Ferrell, Earl Whitehill and Edie Durham, provided the features of the American league's day. Ferrell won his 20th victory of the season as Cleveland came back from five straight defeats to pound out a 10 to 0 triumph over the Philadelphia Athletics.

Whitehill won his 17th successive game, setting a major league record for the season as he beat the New York Yankees, 5 to 1, on a seven hit and eleven strikeout pitching performance. Durham, pitching in a lesser cause, turned in the best hurling job of the day. He shut out the St. Louis Browns with four singles and without a free trip to first to give Boston a 3 to 0 victory.

Washington's Senators used three hurlers in their final clash with Chicago and obtained the best results of them all so far as the standings were concerned although they had something of a struggle to win a 5 to 4 decision.

MORGAN BEATS "WILDCAT" IN SEATTLE TILT

SEATTLE, Aug. 15 (AP)—Tod Morgan, for whom many fight fans have been chanting since he was supposedly spent himself so often defeating the world junior lightweight crown he wore recently, is being acclaimed today by that same "Tackle crowd" as a real contender in the next heavier division of lightweight.

In the outstanding fight of the season here, he surprised more than 9,000 fans in the civic auditorium last night by showing superb condition after all his campaigning in defeating Leslie "Wildcat" Carter in six rounds.

Carter put up a game fight against the most experienced Seattle boxer but the negro was no match and the decision was easily Morgan's.

The first round was tame, with each feeling their way, but from then on Morgan was master and his left hand continually twisted his rival. Carter tried gamely to cope with the brilliant boxing of Morgan who opened with the south but the former Everett fighter stayed with him and in the fifth drove Morgan into a corner.

The fight was forecast as having a decisive bearing on futures of both men who have recently entered the lightweight division. Carter had a slight weight advantage, entering the ring at 137½, to Morgan's 136½.

pendent upon whether it is necessary to drill 1,000 or 1,500 feet. The first well is only a little more than 100 feet deep, while the second well is nearly 1,600 feet into the ground. It is believed that both tap the same water source, because of the same pressure and temperature of the water. A porous section of earth would account for the difference in depth. It is said that there is a plentiful supply for a third well is regarded by city officials and Mr. Durant as certain. Government figures show that when two wells tapping a source of underground water, do not affect each other, there is a room for another. Whenever a well's flow affects others tapping the same water, then the capacity has been reached. At present the capacity of the sheet of water La Grande is using has not been reached, it was said.

Start Work This Fall
 The plan is to start drilling this fall with the hopes of hooking a third well onto the city system before May or June. The well will be drilled close to the other two, located near the Second street viaduct.


When the commission voted on the motion to authorize the drawing up of a contract, Commissioner V. H. Melville voted no, explaining that while he favored a deep well, he did not want to go on record as favoring drawing up a contract with any one person or firm without calling for bids on the project. Commissioners A. T. Hill and Charles Playle voted yes because they were sure that Mr. Durant, who drilled the other two wells, was the best possible well driller that could be obtained for this work.

The matter of financing the well was taken care of and the cost will be spread over a period of four years, with each installment and the annual interest entered into each year's budget. In this way the city will be able to pay for the well within four years without causing much of an addition to the city taxes. A little may be shaved from other items in the budget to allow for the well's cost, thereby holding the total expenditures at about the same figure as in the past, it was said. The charges will be shown up in November and becomes operative on Dec. 1.


Commissioners at the meeting last night emphasized the fact that citizens and business men of the city have been persistent in their requests for an additional well to increase the supply of water, and they feel that the majority of the people of La Grande approve the plan.

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
