While in Yakima they attended a reunion of the Minton family at which about 85 relatives were present. All eight of Mr. Minton's brothers and sisters were together for the first time in 40 years. Family Flours 20 Cents Lower; Potatoes Climb
PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 15 (AP)—Both the butter and egg markets were steady today with retail trade reported good. Family flours were 20c lower. Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the U. S. department of agriculture says: Tomato growers at The Dalles, who have supplied most of Portland's offerings, are withholding shipments temporarily to remedy yesterday's disastrous oversupply. Stocks are clearing up well today, although at low prices. Yakima 30-lb. bags are moving very slowly at about 80c. Peaches are moving in slower volume to Portland home-canners, than many distributors anticipated. Elbertas show very wide range in quality. Some Californias show very fine quality, but mostly only fair to ordinary. There is a temporary shortage of Yakima potatoes, and a 10c advance in prices here. Locals are mostly of excellent quality, and are unchanged in price. Carlots of celery now landing at Brooks are meeting with very sluggish demand, and prices are extremely low.

FEAR 46 MEN IN MINE ARE DEAD

to the haulage tunnel and about 3,500 feet from the mine portal. Workmen had penetrated 2,900 feet from the entrance last night. They reported the tunnel choked with debris and said the work of clearing the passageways was constantly becoming more difficult on account of the lack of air. Miners were permitted to work only a few minutes each. Many of them were brought out reeling from effects of the noxious gases. Of the 46 men imprisoned, 18 are married. Their families clustered about the mine entrance but only the most optimistic hoped their loved ones would be recovered alive. In three instances brothers were trapped in the cave-in.
