The United States commercial crop is now forecast at 30,922,000 barrels compared with 28,973,000 barrels in 1929...

The prune crop of western Oregon has been hit hard by unfavorable weather conditions, and with the present price and market outlook it is quite possible that much of the fruit may not be harvested...

WASHINGTON (John S. Dennee, Agr. Statistician) "Apples in the major producing areas are sizing well because of the favorable growing weather. But in some parts of the Yakima valley the fruit is showing marking and irregularities resultant from frost in the spring...

CHERRY harvest was being completed in Eastern Oregon on August 1, with about a normal production, but more small sizes than usual. In Wasco and Hood River counties the crop was a little above average...

IDAHO (J. H. Jacobsen, Agr. Statistician) "Apple carlot shipments will probably be around 20 to 25 per cent less than in 1929 (7131 cars in 1929). The crop is spotted in that some orchards are light and others are loaded...
