## ART SCHOOL DONATION MAY BE PERMANENT

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 15 (AP)—If the University of Oregon, at its summer session this year, is successful in conducting an art center granted by the Carnegie foundation, and representing a \$5,000 gift towards that activity, the grant probably will be made annually, the gift increased to \$10,000 and the university made the western center of the foundation's art activity. This was stated by Dr. E. E. Lindsay, secretary of the state board of higher education. In the past it was said, this donation has been made only to the art institute of Chicago and to Harvard University, the latter being the eastern center.

In addition to this the Carnegie foundation has donated to the University of Oregon \$2,500 toward an art collection.

Gifts were acknowledged by Dr. Lindsay.

## GEO. H. KELLY PASSES AWAY IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Aug. 15 (AP)—George H. Kelly, 63, prominent lumberman and Portland contractor, died here Thursday in a hospital as the result of a heart attack suffered two weeks ago while supervising one of the many projects the Kelly and Sullivan Contracting company had been awarded.

Kelly was born in Springfield, Ore., and attended the University of Oregon. He was one of the founders of the Booth-Kelly Lumber company at Eugene.

At the beginning of the World war, he resigned his connection with this company and accepted a commission as lieutenant colonel in command of the 20th engineers in France. He supervised extensive lumber operations there and when the war closed he had 90 mills in operation.

Following his return from France, Kelly organized the Western Oregon Lumber company in 1923. At the time of his death he was chairman of the board of directors. The plant was located at West Fir, Ore., where the family home is located. In 1923 he also organized the Kelly-Sullivan company.

He is survived by his widow and four daughters. Funeral arrangements have not been made.

Kelly was stricken while supervising the activities of 1,000 men clearing land on the Lewis River power project in Washington.

## O. N. G. Receiving More Equipment

SALEM, Ore., (AP)—Since July 1 the Oregon National Guard has received from the federal government about \$500,000 worth of new and heavier equipment for the arsenal at Camp Clackamas, for the use of the 218th field artillery regiment. In addition to this, it was said at national guard headquarters, \$461,250 worth of new equipment has been received. Included in the equipment received since July 1 are 18 new 155-millimeter howitzers. These are propelled by five-ton tractors and 36 of these have been received. Also there are several thousand dollars worth of delicate instruments used in artillery operations. The howitzers replace the lighter 75-millimeter guns formerly used.

The change is incident to the conversion of the 218th into regimental status.
