Business Gains Are Noted Over United States

A recent statement issued by H. F. Best, eastern manager of M. C. McGraw and Co., and newly elected president of the Six-Point League of New York, contains the following items of interest:

"Business has continued to move along the path of readjustment during July despite the fact that the seasonal slackening normal to the month brought the general level of industrial activity close to the low point of several years.

"Automobile production is one line which shows an increase for August following the temporary shut-down of many plants during a part of July. The Ford company alone has re-hired 100,000 men. The motor factories are established as a main cog of the general industrial machine, and a speeding up there will stimulate the steel and other important industries.

"Expectations of a resumption of general production rest largely upon the much reduced inventory stocks of manufactured goods revealed in many lines by the mid-year stock taking. This is taken to mean that the accumulations resulting from last year's production have been largely worked out of the business organism.

"The National Association of Credit Men says in a recent bulletin: 'Inventories are low in all lines of business. Buying for replenishment of stocks must begin soon. We have managed thus far with no conspicuous failures and no serious damage to our machinery of production and distribution. Collections in eastern states were better in June than in May.'

"This evidence that business is nearing the upturn, and all can help by judicious buying."

MENCKEN WILL BE HANDY MAN ABOUT HOUSE

BALTIMORE (AP)—When Sara Haardt weds H. L. Mencken next September she will find the arch-bachelor of the literary world a decidedly handy man about the house. An ornate brick wall and walk at his home here, for example, is his own handiwork.

In a magazine, book and newspaper Mencken has written on the home, domestic relations and marriage, but a recent article reveals a study of domestic problems such as a newlywed might make.

In it he sets forth his belief in the superiority of gas heaters to any other form.

Less than four years ago he wrote that marriage "does not appear very forcibly to my private tastes." He added that getting married was "comparable to entering a monastery or enlisting for war."

But now he tells friends: "I formerly was not as wise as I am now." Miss Haardt, also a writer, pretty and 18 years younger than Mencken, who will be 50 September 12, had this to say:

"I've read everything Mr. Mencken ever wrote about marriage and I think his opinions were very well put. I think they are absolutely true when applied to most marriages, but of course they don't apply to every marriage."

"They will live in Baltimore. But neither will say where they will live, any more than they will divulge details of the wedding."

AIR MEETING WILL BE HELD IN THIS STATE

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—J. D. Wood, commissioner of public works for Idaho and chairman of the Western States Aeronautics association, and Frank McKee, director of aeronautics for California state chamber of commerce, announced the open meeting of the aero association would be held here December 5 and 6. More than 200 persons from western states are expected.

Governors or their official representatives from the 11 western states will be the only voting members of the conference. The postoffice department, aeronautics division of the department of commerce, the army and navy, the aeronautical chamber of commerce, the National Aeronautical association, airplane manufacturers and others will send delegates.

"The purpose of the association is to study the needs of the aviation industry within the states and coordinate the various governments and state agencies in promoting uniform development of commercial aviation," Woods said.

"The specific object of the association is to promote uniform legislation, interstate airways, uniform taxation to get away from the doubt caused in the early history of the automobile and to work with federal experts in helping the development of aviation as far as we can," he said.

The Western States Aeronautics association, the only one of its kind in the nation, includes Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Utah, Nevada, Wyoming, California, Arizona, Colorado and New Mexico.

Many Write To Governor About Clifford, Clark

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 16 (AP)—With letters and telegrams received from Multnomah county included, among communications reaching Governor Norblad relative to the game commission's custer of Game Warden Harold Clifford and Assistant Warden Ed Clark, endorsements and commendations of the commission's action are about equally divided, the governor said Friday. But outside of Multnomah county, organizations and individuals that commend the Clifford administration, Norblad said, are vastly in the majority.

A paradoxical telegram came from the Jackson County Game Protective association, signed by Olin Arnsperger, president, and the board of directors. It read:

"The Jackson County Game Protective association strongly endorses and supports the action of the majority of the state game commission in the removal of Warden Clifford. That his administration has been efficient in the highest degree is well known to all since his removal. His conservationist, familiar with the conduct and operation of the state game warden's office. We are endorsing no successor. But earnestly ask your support of those commissioners who are men of integrity and honor and entirely capable of reorganizing the game department on an efficient and respectable basis."

The Multnomah and Manufacturers association of Oregon, a Portland organization, points to the possibility of "harmful reaction" in "changing horns in mid-stream," and endorses Clifford's administration as economical. Evidence of this, the letter said, was a comparison of the condition of the commission's treasury when Clifford took office and its condition now.

Emmett Howard of Eugene, member of the legislature and candidate for speaker of the house, urges the governor to "take the bull by the horns, reinstate Clifford and have the legislature the job."

The governor said he was not prepared to say what the termination of the affair may be. He was still studying the transcript of the testimony taken at the hearings, and had also procured the briefs submitted by Clifford and Clark.

He has received about 150 letters and telegrams.

TIME AND SPACE LINKED IN NEW THEORY OF SOUND

NEW YORK (AP)—Space and time are linked in a theory of hearing advanced in a report to the Acoustical Society of America by its president, Dr. Harvey Fletcher.

In hearing, some scientists have held that time of the vibrations was the important factor. Others have considered the pattern the sound waves make in space as the distinguishing difference between sounds.

Some sound waves are long and smooth; others are crowded together. Dr. Fletcher shows how both the time and space components are impressed on the membranes of the inner ear and concludes that "space-time" is the way to account for the effects.
