Luper Will Be Asked to Make An Explanation

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 21 (AP) — State Engineer Rhos Luper will be asked at a specially called meeting of the state reclamation commission Tuesday, Aug. 26, to explain a statement made in an audit of Luper's accounts wherein it is said that he has retained since October, 1926, about \$1800 in interest on funds of irrigation districts. An auditor's report made by Otto F. Kubin, accountant for the state department, says Luper has neither turned the money over to the state nor credited it to the funds that earned it.

Luper says that he can readily account for the money if the commission would accept a statement he holds that the interest does not belong to the state since it is not earned by state money.

The auditor's report says that when Luper was appointed state engineer in 1926 he became custodian of a sum of \$23,955.

This money was deposited in the Salem Bank of Commerce. The report states "A total of \$29,950 was in a checking account and \$20,000 in a savings account. Later \$2000 was withdrawn from the checking account and added to the savings account. During the time that this \$22,000 was in the savings account it earned \$1800.20 interest, which was withdrawn, and, as far as we have been able to determine, has not been accounted for to the state."

The savings account was closed and transferred to the checking account in October, 1926, since which time we were informed no interest had been paid on this account, which has maintained an average balance of approximately \$35,000. It would seem in order that some method should be devised whereby these funds should earn some interest."

A further deficit to balance accounted for in the sum of \$1550.48 is mentioned in the report, but it is said to be of technical nature.

Disbursement of funds of the Warm Springs irrigation district, accruing from the sale of district bonds, interest coupons at discount to district landowners, is criticized in the report. Proceeds of the sale are said to have been used by the bondholders' committee to pay committee expenses.

The transactions under scrutiny occurred mainly prior to the period covered by the audit, which was the year 1927, 1928 and 1929. A previous audit, made by the late G. Ed. Ross, held, according to Luper, that it was not necessary to account for interest on the funds.

Luper's report suggests that the engineering department should make daily turnovers to the state treasurer as provided for by an act of 1929, instead of at longer intervals as allowed by an older law.

Receipts of butter and reported lighter and coolers have been called on to supply the demand.

Egg prices were fairly steady with supply ample for all needs.

The cantaloupe prices declined with heavy receipts from Yakima. Good green corn is scarcer at \$1.25 per sack of six dozen ears.

Alfalfa Market Steady, Stronger During the Week

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21 (AP) — Alfalfa markets were steady to somewhat stronger during the week ending August 19, with most offerings generally in good demand, according to the weekly alfalfa market review of the United States bureau of agricultural economics. A holding tendency continued on the part of growers in many sections. However, offerings were of sufficient volume to prevent any great advance in prices.

Generous rains during the week relieved droughty conditions in Kansas and Nebraska, while many other areas remained dry. Pastures generally were reported in the poorest condition recorded by the weather bureau in the sixty-seven years for which records are available. Because of this unusually low carrying capacity of pastures in most sections, many farmers have found it necessary to begin feeding hay and feed grains. A 50% reduction in freight rates has been made by railroads operating in states

within the drought-stricken area. This reduction is granted only on the movement of livestock out of the dry sections and the shipment of hay and feed into these states for relief purposes.
