Flying Fleet To Be Here Sunday For 2-Day Stop

A two-day series of free exhibitions will be given at Gekeler field on the highway beginning Sunday. The Flying Fleet, a nationally known group of commercial aviators, a field representative announced today.

ARCTIC MYSTERY FINALLY SOLVED (Continued from Page One) from the Andree balloon, for the bodies which the expedition is bringing back were found in the remains of a camp which the aeronauts had made on White Island.

Log Book Found—The log book of the balloon, inscribed "Andree's Polar Expedition" was found in the camp. The dispatches stated, Andree's frozen body was found a short distance from the cliff and another body at some distance. The location of the expedition had outlived his companions and had made desperate but little struggles to keep alive.

The camp of the explorers was situated about 500 feet from shore. There were many evidences the explorers had lived there for some time after disaster had overtaken the expedition, Andree's body was

found a short distance from a boat which contained what apparently had been a human body.
