PARLIAMENT UNCONCERNED ABOUT FRENCH ATHLETICS

PARIS (AP)—Sporting societies in France show great discouragement over their failure to interest parliament in the value of athletics in building a nation.

When Premier Tardieu proposed vast expenditures for "national equipment" to give the country roads, docks, laboratories, hospitals and methods, there was included \$1,200,000 for playgrounds and athletic fields. This was cut down in the Chamber of \$80,000 a year for five years.

OLD MASTER PRAISES WOOD

NEW YORK (AP)—Sidney B. Wood, Jr., 18-year-old New York youth, is the most improved tennis player in the country, according to Big Bill Tilden. The veteran Davis Cup star made the observation after Wood defeated Frank Shields, who had eliminated Tilden from the Southampton, L. I. tournament.

FEW OFFICERS TRAINED IN ALL PHASES OF FLYING

WASHINGTON (AP)—Of more than 1,250 officers in the air corps, there are only 18 with experience in all branches of military aviation.

The service has four flying ratings: airplane pilot, air observer, airship pilot, and balloon observer, all of which are held by the 18 officers.

Sixty per cent of all officers in the service have more than one rating, while 12 have no rating.

43 GLIDER LICENSES ISSUED

WASHINGTON (AP)—Headed by Clarence M. Young, assistant secretary of commerce for aeronautics, with license number one, 43 glider pilot licenses have been issued.

LOW-FLYING PLANES OPPOSED

BERLIN (AP)—An increasing number of airplane crashes and forced landings within the city limits has revived a demand that planes be required to fly higher above the city than the present 300-meter limit. This is declared insufficient for gliding to a safe landing.

REFUELING PLANE, SETTING WORLD RECORD, TESTS TIRES SEVERELY



WHEN the four famous Hunter brothers set a new world endurance record for an airplane refueling flight, the equipment on their two planes was given a severe test.

In most cases, the strain was most severe on the two brothers who flew in the "City of Chicago" and on the equipment in their ship.

The test of the tires was most severe, however, on the refueling plane, "Big Ben," which made about 200 take-offs and landings during the 22 days that the flight lasted. Throughout the flight, the General Airplane tires on "Big Ben" as well as on the "City of Chicago" performed perfectly.
