Women Protest At Gerard List Of Men Rulers

By Bess Furman WASHINGTON, Aug. 22 (AP)—Former Ambassador Gerard's list of 64 men who "rule the United States" was protested here today by the women-folk. They objected to his omission of any woman power.

"I am afraid Mr. Gerard's long residence in Germany has rather given him an un-American viewpoint regarding women's contribution to the life of the United States," remarked Mrs. John F. Sippel, president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs.

Several refused to accept what they termed the "obvious money magazine basis" of Gerard's opinion of this country's control.

"Names of women regarded by women as potent in the nation's weal were cited."

"For the country's good, I would rather have fifty-nine women like Carrie Chapman Catt than fifty-nine men like those," said Mrs. Roscoe Anderson, acting president of the national league of women voters, of Mr. Gerard's original list.

"I concede many on the list are very public-spirited."

As a woman of great wealth combined with personal and political power, Mrs. Anderson mentioned Mrs. Casper Whitney, of New York.

Mrs. Sippel concided with Mrs. Anderson in Mrs. Catt's nomination, and added Alice Ames Winter, "pen-woman and patriot."

"One cannot consider the history of the United States in the next ten years without reckoning with Alice Paul," said Miss Maude Younger, legislative chairman of the national women's party.

Miss Younger cited motion picture and lumber industries on Gerard's list as not being particularly powerful on the national scene, and declared it quite possible for various women's organizations to compete with them in shaping the laws of the nation.

Her final shot was that while Gerard's list was "pretty bald," it did show women would have to get the economic power so they would be able to present "comparative magnates like the late Betty Green and Lady Rhonda in England."

GERARD ADDS 5 NAMES TO 'OUR RULERS' Collisions Silent If Bumper Used

NEW YORK, Aug. 23 (AP)—James W. Gerard, former ambassador to Germany, has added five names to his list of fifty-nine "men who rule the United States."

The additional telephoned to the New York Times from Newport, R. I., where Mr. Gerard is the guest of General Cornelius Vanderbilt, are: Sidney Z. Mitchell, chairman of the board of the Electric Bond and Share company, and a large owner of public utilities.

Walter Edwin Frew, chairman of the board of the Corn Exchange Bank Trust company.

Amadeo P. Giannini, founder of the Bank of Italy and of the trans-American corporation, the world's largest holding company of bank securities.

William Green and Matthew Wolf, president and vice president respectively of the American federation of labor.

In a pamphlet endorsing the crusade of Lord Beaverbrook and Viscount Rothermere for empire free trade and a high British tariff, published in London several days ago, Mr. Gerard wrote of "forty men who rule the United States" and suggested such men aided by a high British tariff could mend England's fortunes in ten years.
