Lon Chaney, Man of a Thousand Faces, is Dead

out a teacher the fine points of acting which later in life won him fame. He got his first "break" as a "song and dance man" at a stagehands' benefit when he was 19 years old.

With his portrayal of "The Frog" in the "Miracle Man," came Chaney's shift from slapsticks and westerns to the grotesque characterizations that were to make him famous. Frequently as a "singer" by Chaney expressed the opinion that the "Miracle Man" was the only perfect film ever made.

Perfect or not, it was to start him off on a series of unique character roles that was to be halted only with his death.

With his portrayals of strange, un-human characters of the world of make believe, Chaney himself slipped into a life of seclusion that well might have fitted in with the life of some of his screen characterizations.

He refused interviews—"none of the public's damned business," he would say—shunned persons, appearances and, utterly refused to attend premier showings. After working hours he sought the seclusion of his home and the small circle of friends who welcomed him. Among those acquaintances were General Smedley Butler, of the United States marine and Eddie Griffin, the comedian.

A deep student wholly self-educated, he was a voracious reader and a deep student of many subjects. He wrote the Encyclopedia Britannica's chapter on screen make-up. Although often portraying the cripple or deformed character, Chaney off the lot was athletic and strong. His hobbies were fishing, football and prizefighting.

From the formidable list of starring vehicles Chaney has appeared in, outstanding are "The Miracle Man," "The Penalty," "Hunchback of Notre Dame," "Phantom of the Opera," "Laugh, Clown, Laugh," and "The Holy Terror." No sacrifice was too great for the actor to undergo if it meant the better his portrayal and frequently he suffered painfully while the camera ground away. To his death he carried a kink in his back resulting from the unnatural strapping of his legs to act the part of a legless man.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Aug. 26 (AP)—The fact that Lon Chaney was the son of deaf mutes was always attributed by friends in his birthplace as being largely responsible for his facility to pantomime which made him one of the screen's foremost stars.

In order to convey impressions to his father and mother, Chaney resorted to sign language and facial expressions. This his friends say, laid the foundation for his screen success.

In his youth Chaney gained a reputation as a football player. He was halfback on an independent eleven. He left school to guide tourists up Pike's Peak.
