## Fifth Shamrock Now Ready For American Race

NEWPORT, R. I. (AP)—Sir Thomas Lipton was in his prime back in 1899 when he came to these shores with his first Shamrock.

He will be well into his 81st year when his fifth challenger for America's cup, Shamrock V, crosses the starting line off here with an American defender September 13.

Four times he has tried and failed to win the famous "mug," and he remains a hopeful challenger.

Probably never has sentiment been so favorable to the old knight, American yachtsmen are indebted to him for keeping alive the greatest of yachting classics.

No other European has shown an inclination to cross the sea in quest of the 100 guinea cup won by the yacht America in 1851.

Certainly no other better deserves the right to fly the flag of the Royal Ulster Yacht club, bearing as it does the Red Hand of the O'Neils, or the Red Hand of Ulster.

History has it that the leader of an expedition invading Ireland in the dim past told his men that the first to touch land would be made chieftain.

As their vessel approached the shore, one of the men, Nial, chopped off his left hand. With his right he threw the severed member ashore and became first in line of Irish chieftains bearing the name O'Neil.

The first challenger Lipton sent over in 1899 was defeated by the Columbia, and the same defender repelled the second Shamrock invasion two years later.

Reliance took three straight races from Shamrock III, when Lipton again threw down a challenge at the end of the two year period.

Sir Thomas did not challenge again until 1913, and due to the world war, the race was not run until 1920, when the Resolute saved the cup, after losing the first two of the five tests.

Four American yachts, Westamoe, Enterprise, Yankee and Whirlwind, are contending for the honor of meeting what probably will be Sir Thomas' last bid.

## Detroit's "City Within City" Moves to Recall Its Mayor

DETROIT (AP)—Now the recall bug has bitten Detroit's "city within a city."

The suburb of Hamtramck, a city of approximately 50,000 entirely surrounded by Detroit, is following the example of the metropolis by seeking to recall its mayor, Dr. Rudolph G. Tenerowicz.

Petitions in circulation ask his removal on 11 grounds.

Sponsors of Hamtramck's move hope to have an election called for September 9, the date of Detroit's mayoral vote, the result of the recall of Mayor Charles Bowles.

Hamtramck, uniquely located so there is no access to or egress from the suburb except through Detroit streets, frequently has been turbulent politically.

About 70 per cent of its population, which experienced a record increase from 3,550 to 46,615 from 1910 to 1920, is foreign-born, mostly Polish.

The recall situation in Hamtramck closely parallels that in Detroit.

Charges against Dr. Tenerowicz include allegations of squandering of public funds, toleration of vice, creation of unnecessary offices, inconsistent tax assessments, and denial to electors of the right to inspect books of the city controller.

Hamtramck's recall movement is backed by the suburb's real estate

board and its taxpayers' association.

Dr. Tenerowicz, a physician whose term in office has been marked by frequent political quarrels, has denied all charges outlined in petitions.

It was in Hamtramck that the city council asked state police aid to "clean up" the suburb in 1923. In 1924 the then mayor and 13 others, including a police lieutenant, were convicted of liquor conspiracy.
