Howe believes the state should issue side-arms to the traffic officers and ask for a conference with Flannery on that subject. At present each officer furnishes his own gun.

Twenty Girls Seek Every Chorus Job As Broadway's 'Beauty Market' Slumps



These are lean days for Broadway's beautiful but nimble, with 20 chorus girls for every job. The groups (above) rehearsing and being given instructions were among 35 girls picked from 1,500 who sought places in "Fine and Dandy," a new show.

NEW YORK (AP)—Ladies of the chorus are just ladies of the mob these days.

The Broadway beauty market has dropped to a new low and chorus girls can be hired as one manager puts it, for a dime a dozen.

Three thousand girls are waiting at stage doors for jobs that aren't there.

Every day this army of the idle is increased by arrival of more young women who have left their home towns for Times Square.

When the new theatrical season opened there were only three musical shows in New York, and only three others ready to open. Usually at this time there are from 12 to 15

musicals preparing for Broadway premieres.

Each show employs an average of 25 chorus girls, and the returns have less. With only six shows playing or in rehearsal, this provides approximately 150 jobs to take care of 3,000 chorines. In other words, there are 20 girls for each job.

Every chorus call brings out a crowd that almost needs a cordon of police to handle. When an audition was announced for one new show more than 1,500 applied. From this 1,500 a chorus of 35 was selected.

Though butter trading opened slow prices were held up to ranges of the day before on strength of light receipts. Much storage butter was being used due to difference in price.

Market for Yakima cantaloupes is practically demoralized by heavy receipts, brokers track sales bringing barely freight charges in some instances.

Watermelons are weaker, demand light, even at lower prices of \$1.50 @ \$1.75 per cwt. to retailers.

Peaches, green corn and tomatoes enjoy firm demand at steady prices.

Green peaches are starting to move from the new Marshfield district where 300 acres are in bearing with quality and yields reported only fair.
