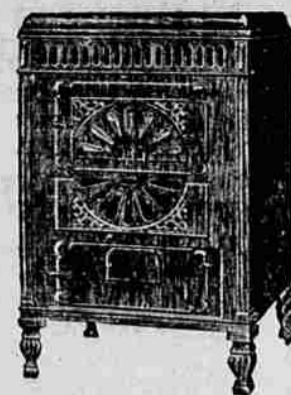

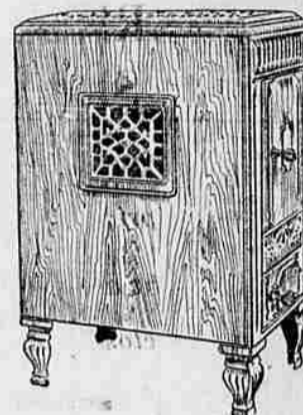

### CUBS BEATEN IN 20-INNING GAME

#### Cardinals Make it Nine Straight — Brooklyn Moves to Second Place.

Fullerton Jr. (Associated Press Sports Writer) At least three teams in the National league apparently have no intention of letting the Chicago Cubs capture another pennant without a battle. With their successive triumphs over Brooklyn and New York, the Cubs seemed to be having things much their own way, then along came the St. Louis Cardinals to cause trouble. The Cards, who have been creeping up in fourth place for some time, moved into Chicago yesterday with a record of the eight straight victories. Instead of following the example of their predecessors and letting themselves be knocked out of such a place, they fought through the major league's longest game to make it nine straight with an 8 to 7 triumph in 20 innings. For six innings Burleigh Grimes shut out the champions while the Cards piled up a five-run lead. Then Grimes weakened and before Sylvester Johnson took over the mound duty, the Cubs had tied the score at 5-5.

#### Johnson Finishes Game

Johnson finished the game for St. Louis, hurling 12 innings and giving only nine hits. And Young Bob Osborn, who opposed him for the last nine frames, did about as well. Each had one bad inning, the pitcher, but it failed to break the deadlock, each team scoring twice. In the twentieth, Douthitt singled, advanced to second as Adams was thrown out and scored on Higley's single with the run which finally decided the game after four hours and ten minutes of play.

#### Brooklyn complicated the standing by taking second place from New York by an 8 to 7 victory.

#### Pittsburgh's Pirates slammed out a pair of victories over Cincinnati to carry their winning streak to ten victories in 12 games. A 16 hit result in the first game offset the slugging of Harry Heilmann and gave Pittsburgh a 16 to 12 victory. Fifteen more wallops won the second game by an 11 to 2 count. Heilmann hit two home runs and a double in the opening clash to drive in seven runs.

#### The Boston Braves, aided by Walter Berger's 31st home run, posted out a 13 to 10 victory over Philadelphia.

#### Senators Move Up

Washington's Senators continued their efforts to make the American league race resemble that in the elder circuit by routing the New York Yankees, 6 to 3. The Athletics ran afoul of some of the great pitching the last-place Boston Red Sox have been getting and lost a 2 to 1 decision as Red Lizenbee out-pitched George Earnshaw with a six-hit performance.

#### The tie in games for sixth place in the standing crept up to the St. Louis Browns continued to out-play the Detroit Tigers, gaining a 9 to 1 victory. The Chicago White Sox, after pulling ahead at Cleveland's expense, dropped back again when, opposed by Wesley Ferrell, the big Indian tricker won his 23rd victory of the season and his 12th in succession by a 10 to 3 count.

#### Both the winning streak and the victory total are the best of the season for the major leagues.

#### Charlie Root's Arm Injured Wednesday

CHICAGO, Aug. 29 (AP)—Manager Joe McCarthy is beginning to believe there is no justice for his Cubs, what with injuries and losing games.

The latest blow is an injury to Charlie Root's pitching arm which may keep him out for two weeks. Root sustained a muscle in the arm in the first inning of Wednesday's game with Pittsburgh.

### Baer, Hudkins And Others Are On "Black List"

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 29 (AP)—Inquiries into the death of Frankie Campbell, heavyweight prizefighter who died after taking a beating at the hands of Max Baer in the ring here Monday night, waited today on the completion of a coroner's investigation.

#### Baer and eight others connected with the fight were temporarily suspended by the state athletic commission late yesterday. The commission then deferred further action until civil and criminal proceedings are completed. Baer is to appear in superior court on a manslaughter charge Sept. 12.

#### The commission suspended Toby Irwin, referee; J. H. Lorimer, Baer's manager; Ray Carlin and Frankie Burns, seconds; C. E. Working, Campbell's manager; Tom Maloney, Tillie "Kid" Herman and Larry Morrison, seconds of Campbell.

#### Hudkins Suspended

The commission also suspended Ace Hudkins, erstwhile "Nebraska Wildcat" and Jack McVey, New York negro middleweight, and their managers for an unsatisfactory bout in Los Angeles Tuesday. Their prizes were forfeited.

#### Chet Shandell, San Francisco heavyweight, was ordered removed from a Hollywood card tonight. The commission held he was not a fit opponent for Les Kennedy of Los Angeles.

#### DELIGHTFUL SENTENCE

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 29 (AP)—Policeman George Havior is to undergo delightful punishment. Reproved for being off duty he was sentenced to be a guard of honor for his daughter, Margaret and escorted her to City Hall for honors when she returns home from Toronto, where she won a marathon swim. He was swept away from his post in a rebellion when news came of the victory.

HOUSTON, Tex., Aug. 29 (AP)—Tony Kaufman, former Chicago Cubs pitcher, led other members of the Houston Texas league baseball team through a blazing building to the rescue of a 70-year-old negro woman last night.

#### GRID SEASON OPENS

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va., Aug. 29 (AP)—Football is at hand. Yes, sir. The season opens tomorrow with Charlottesville playing Washington. They are boys' teams.

#### FILE NOMINATION CERTIFICATE

SALER, Ore., Aug. 29 (AP)—The certificate of nomination and the acceptance of Julius Meier as an independent candidate for governor were filed with the secretary of state yesterday. #### Sport Slants

By Alan J. Gould (Associated Press Sports Editor) Is Connie Mack's last any suggestion to make about the outcome of

the National league pennant race, the probability is that he would nominate his old rival, John McGraw, to carry the opposing banner in the world's series this October.

Since there is every reason to suspect that the A's will repeat in their own circuit, the question of the National league's entry in the big series may be said to occupy some of the spare thoughts of Mr. Mack and his athletes.

The Pirates, the Cardinals and the Cubs all have been tried and found wanting in the last few championship battles, so much so that in three successive years these clubs have collected an aggregate of exactly one victory in thirteen starts against the Yankees and Athletics.

Brooklyn, which has not won since 1920 and was not much of a series factor then, has lately shown signs of fading rapidly from the pennant picture. They have called, however, and are again pressing the Cubs. The Cubs may repeat, but the Giants and Robins still have a lot to say about the matter.

It is fairly safe to suggest that National league men as a whole, in addition to Mr. Mack, would be delighted to have John McGraw do the master minding in the series again, though the motives involved would be somewhat different.

What the N. L. wants is a fighting team in the main event stepping to regain the old circuit's prestige. McGraw has the outfit calculated to do it plus the experience that such leaders as Bush, McKechnie and McCarty have lacked.

Connie believes the Giants would be the most troublesome of any of the National league teams in the short limits of a world's series, but he would rather match wits with McGraw again than anyone else in baseball. Triumph would be sweeter, defeat less bitter to swallow, in such a contest.

The years have not dimmed Connie Mack's memory of his famous battles with McGraw in the world's series of 1905, when Christy Mathewson hurled three shutouts against the A's of 1911 and 1913, when Mack's greatest team turned the tables on the New Yorkers.

Mathewson was at his height in 1905 and I have never witnessed greater pitching than he showed against us.

Mack told me in a recent chat over old times. "It was wonderful. Six years later Matty was still the toughest of them all to beat. I have never seen his equal taking everything into consideration."

After all is said and done, McGraw seems about the only major league manager qualified by success, experience and wits to make it interesting for Mack, who has no rivals whatever in the American league.

Pilets like Johnson, Wagner, Bush, Shawkey, Killefer, Peckinpaugh and Harris have done well but they were either in kindergarten or just blossoming out on schoolboy diamonds when Connie Mack was winning American league pennants. Shawkey was one of his pitching pupils.

### This Game Of Golf

Golfers, when not engaged in arguing about something else, usually put on a debate as to the relative merits of what they call the "flat" swing and the "upright" swing, and some of the funniest theories and conjectures in golf are likely to result.

For example, I heard one enthusiastic duffer lately citing Johnny Farrell as a brilliant example of the upright swinger.

This would have been considerably more effective had it not been for the fact that Johnny is not an upright swinger at all.

The most obvious characteristic of the swing, whether flat or upright, is the position of the hands at the top of the stroke. That is what the neophyte sees most clearly and is usually on what he bases his conclusions.

Johnny lifts his hands freely and very high, at the top of the backswing, well over the point of the right shoulder. Indeed, the position of Johnny's hands at this stage suggests a very upright swing. But it does not insist upon it, and if you will regard the rest of Johnny's method—the free-body-turn, and the way his back at the top of the swing is presented squarely toward the objective of the shot—you will perceive easily that his swing is rather on the flat side.

More important characteristics of the swing are the greater or less pivoting of the hips and shoulders, and the tendency toward lateral hip-motion in place of a twist. With the true upright swing, there is more lateral hip-motion and less twist; the club head travels nearer the vertical plane of the ball.

be an odd development in a pupil right? I should call his swing too-day moderately flat.

As to which method is best, I should say that it depends on the individual and what suits his fancy and his anatomical construction. As a general rule, the tall, slender man inclines to the upright style and the stocky player to the flat swing.

More important characteristics of the swing are the greater or less pivoting of the hips and shoulders, and the tendency toward lateral hip-motion in place of a twist. Harry Vardon is the master of the upright swing, and our rather typical American style of today represents a compromise between his method and the frankly flat swing of the older Scottish professional—taught by men like Alex and Macdonald Smith, Stewart and Jimmy McIndoe. The American style is neither flat nor upright; it is a sensible sort of compromise.

Most casual observers retain the impression that Bobby Jones' swing is essentially upright. This would
