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## English Girl Is Facing Gar Wood In Speed Contest

DETROIT, Aug. 30 (AP)—An English girl who can do a man's job on the water was pitted against Gar Wood, silver haired veteran of countless speedboat races, in the contest for the championship of the world this afternoon on the Detroit river.

Half a million people were expected to witness the first 30 mile heat for the Harmsworth trophy. Miss Marion Barbara Carstairs has two boats entered for Great Britain to challenge Wood's supremacy in the field of unlimited hydroplanes, the Estelle IV and the Estelle V. Wood will defend the trophy for the United States with Miss America V, VII and IX.

If challenging and defending boats perform according to expectation, the record average speed of 75.287 miles per hour for a 30 mile heat made by Wood last year will fall.

Wood has admitted he faces the most serious threat of his title since he won the trophy ten years ago at the Isle of Wight. The Estelle V, at latest, is powered with two giant Napier engines, developing approximately 2800 total horsepower at 3600 revolutions per minute. Miss America IX is equipped with two Packard engines, developing about 2150 horsepower at 2400 R. P. M.

Miss Carstairs has announced, win or lose, this is the last time she will compete for the Harmsworth trophy because of the expense involved.

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
