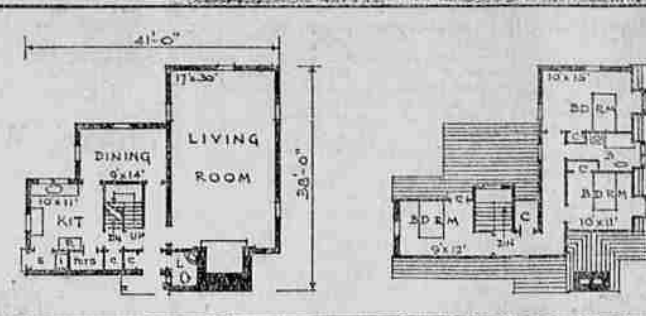
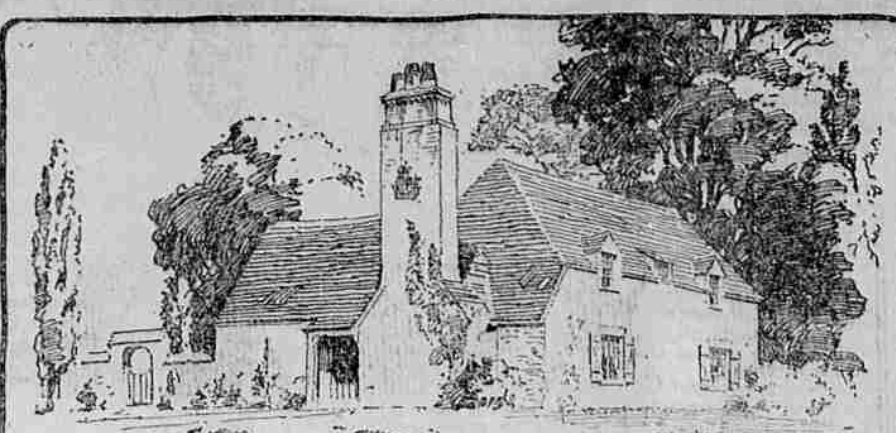

LOW HOUSE HAS FRENCH NORMAN CHARM

In this design there is an attempt to provide a two-story house with all the charm of the old French Norman style.
The front is kept low by the sloping roof, and the chimney is a feature of the front.
Leaves or oak trees on a lot of 75 by 100 feet would be an almost ideal setting for such a house. The plan is for a lot that faces north, as the main rooms face the rear of the lot.
Stairs are conveniently arranged for the housewife who must do her own work. The dining room likewise is convenient from the kitchen, and is easily reached by the open stairs.
There are three bedrooms on the second floor, with a bath, and a large living room on the first floor seems to fit the needs of the present-day family quite adequately. There also are large closets and a lavatory on the first floor.
Exterior walls should be whitewashed, with red or orange pots on the chimney, a reddish-brown tile roof and woodwork of weathered grey. The wall of the front porch might be covered with tile in the same color as the roof.
In most parts of the country this house could be built at a cost between \$10,000 and \$12,000.

Wallowa County Three-Day Fair Opens Thursday

ENTERPRISE, Ore. (Special)—The Wallowa county fair will begin Sept. 4 and last three days. Many horses for racing and bucking at the fair are gathering at the barns. Tryouts for the new horses were held Saturday, 25 being paid for each horse that qualified.
The regular relay will be a three-day event with three horses to each string, running 3 1/2 miles each day. Another daily event will be the chuck wagon race, with two horse teams. GOspel MISSION TO BUILD CHURCH

\$1,000 Will be Spent on New Structure—Year's Total \$415,710.

Building permits for the first eight months of 1930 in La Grande have reached the total of \$415,710, according to an unofficial check made this morning. The total for the month of August was \$8845 and the total for the first seven months was \$406,865.

The largest permit issued last week was to Lester Carlson for the Gospel Mission, to erect a \$1000 church building on Fir between U and V avenues. The Gospel Mission purchased the property recently and razed a house on the lot to make room for the new building, which will also include quarters for the pastor and family. It is to be ready for occupancy Nov. 21 and will be of a one-story bungalow type. Yesterday members of the church held a Labor day "bee" on the new property.

OLD MAN PAR WINS IN FIRST DAY OF PLAY

PEBBLE BEACH, Cal. Sept. 2 (AP)—Balked in their first round efforts to match the par figures of Pebble Beach and Cypress Point, California's leading amateur shot makers marshalled forces today on these two sports courses for the second eighteen which will determine the 32 qualifiers for the 1930 state championship.

Only two of the more than 175 starters in the opening round posted cards even threatening the 72's, needed to equal the par of each course. They were Lawson Little and Roy E. Harris, San Franciscans, who teared the Cypress Point and Pebble Beach respectively in 73's.

Behind this pair trailed many favorites, some so far down the list as to make their chances of qualifying almost out of the question. Scores of 163 or less for the 36 holes were expected to place.
