Postmasters League To Hear Founder

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — A few postmasters of fourth class offices in Hill county, Tex., were banded together in 1904 — and the man who organized them was dismissed from the service.

This fall he will describe that early organization when the National League of District Postmasters meets in Houston September 15 to 19.

He is Oscar Poque, a newspaperman of Hillsboro, Tex. It was his fate to be dismissed "for the good of the service" after he organized county, state and national leagues of postmasters.

The postoffice department now is entirely in accord with the postmasters' league, and representatives of the postmaster-general attend all state and national meetings.

The national league sprang from the county organization started by Poque in 1904. He also was the first president of that group, as well as the Texas state league that also was organized at Hillsboro in 1904.

Now, at the postmasters' request, Poque will describe trials and tribulations of those early organizations at the Houston convention.

Hague Outlines Development In Klamath Falls

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 2 (Special) — Announcement of what is represented as the most gigantic development program in the history of southern and central Oregon is contained in a printed statement sent out from Klamath Falls by Vernon Lester Hague, writer on politics and fine arts and known as "the cowboy critic of the seven arts."

The text of the announcement follows: "Mr. Vernon Lester Hague is pledged to announce decisions to establish in the 'Klamath Kingdom' U. S. A. southern Oregon, northern California and eastward the following enterprises:

"Pacific, Klamath & Ogden Railway Co.' Main line with necessary branches from a Pacific port through or near Grants Pass, Medford, Ashland, Klamath Falls and Lakeview, Oregon, Twin Falls and Burley, Idaho, to Ogden, Utah.

"Newspaper Also Listed: "Union Stockists and Packing Houses," Near Klamath Falls. "White Pelican Hotel and Hot Springs Sanitarium." In or near Klamath Falls.

"Klamath Kingdom Keynote." Metropolitan newspaper, morning, evening and Sunday edition in Klamath Falls.

"Klamath Kingdom Savings Bank." In Klamath Falls. "Harriman Trust Company." In Klamath Falls.

"These plans, an enlargement of plans made 20 years ago and delayed by death and war, will require an investment to exceed \$100,000,000, all of which is to be furnished by one eastern family."

Mr. Hague is a native of Libertyville, Ill., and graduated with a bachelor of arts degree from Parsons college, Fairfield, Ia., in 1908, and his bachelor of arts magna cum laude at Princeton in 1909.

Hague founder of banks. He engaged as a farm broker at Fairfield from 1900 to 1902 and was with the Lee Livestock Commission company at Chicago from 1902 to 1909, holding the position of vice-president and manager. He was a member of the livestock exchange of Chicago and in 1909 and 1910 organized a chain of banks in Texas.

In 1910 he returned to Fairfield as a stock broker and remained there from 1910 until 1925.

He was a candidate for nomination to the United States senate against Senator Brookhart in 1924, but withdrew in favor of a third candidate.

He was a member of the Institute of Politics at Williamstown, Mass., in 1924, and is a member of the chamber of commerce at Klamath Falls. He is a life member of the Red Cross, a member of Whig hall, Princeton; United States public service reserve; world war; Phi Beta Kappa and the Princeton club of New York.

Mr. Hague makes his home at the Claremont hotel in Klamath Falls, but at a late hour yesterday could not be reached. While he makes his home in Klamath Falls, he is away a great deal of the time, and in 1928 made a trip around the world.

TRAILER CARRIES GLIDER FOR YOUTH'S SALES TRIPS

YELLOW SPRINGS, O. (AP) — Two college students are declaring dividends on the country's glider enthusiasm.

Glenn D. Argelinger and St. Plancher, graduates of Antioch college, hitched a glider to their car and started a town-to-town canvass to form clubs and sell the motor-less craft.

They constructed a special trailer to carry the detached wings of the ship with the fuselage clipped in between. The glider may be dismantled and rigged for flight in 45 minutes.

At each town they make demonstration flights, towing the blider into the air by means of the car. Then they organize a club and place their orders.

Pump Irrigation Doubles Crops, Nebraska Area

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Pump irrigation has doubled crop production in central Nebraska sections where rainfall is limited by uneven terrain.

Once considered a risky experiment, irrigation by pumping now is regarded as crop insurance.

More than 17,000 acres in Buffalo county alone are irrigated by this method.

Each of 320 wells now in use is sufficient to water 55 acres in this section, where 67,000 acres of rich farm land is underlaid by a coarse water-bearing gravel.

Wells sunk to a depth of 10 to 20 feet produce a ready supply of water. Production of corn, potatoes and sugar beets has doubled—even tripled—under this type of irrigation.

Potatoes have yielded as high as 200 bushels an acre, while unirrigated fields immediately adjacent have produced only 90 bushels.

When an irrigation well is sunk, it is located at the highest point available with regard to fields to be served. From this point a main ditch is excavated along the highest field line, and from this the laterals are dug.

Exclusive of power for operating, wells for irrigation have been put into operation at an expenditure of from \$500 to \$3,000. Many are pumped by tractor power where electric current is not available.

Long - Ransdell Campaign Stirs Louisiana Votes

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — The race for a United States senate seat between Sen. Joseph E. Ransdell and Gov. Huey P. Long has aroused Louisiana to a high political pitch.

There are no outstanding legislative issues involved, and the campaign has become a battle of personalities to be decided at the primary September 9.

Long says a vote for him means a vote for good roads, while Ransdell retorts that he stands more for good roads than does Long.

Ransdell points to his long legislative record, and Long declares Ransdell has been sleeping in Washington for 30 years.

The governor sought to poke fun at the senator's goatee by referring to him as "Feather Duster" Ransdell.

Ransdell promptly made the feather duster a campaign emblem, accepted a mammoth queer from women voters at a rally and said he would use it to "sweep clean Louisiana politics."

Longpapers, fighting the governor, carried his silk pajamas in which he received a German naval officer on a courtesy call and charge that the governor wishes to be "emperor of Louisiana."

The two men are strikingly different in type.

Ransdell, who went to Washington 31 years ago, when Long was only six years old, possesses great dignity and has the manners of a Lord Chesterfield. He campaigns on an impersonal plane with a soft voice and a guarded tongue.

Governor Long, born and bred in the red hills of middle Louisiana, comes of poor farmer stock and is proud of it. His tactics are spectacular and his speech and manner are ruthless.

AIRPLANE-BUS "HOOKUP"

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Keeping up with the times in transportation, an airplane-motorbus "hookup" has been inaugurated here that cuts approximately three days from the overland travel time between the Midwest and Pacific coast.

The new service is the first daily motorbus-airplane passenger service west of the Mississippi river. It permits passengers to cover the distance between St. Louis, Mo., and Los Angeles in 21 hours and 15 minutes. The eastward trip is made in 26 hours and 30 minutes. Ordinary bus schedules require approximately four days.

UNEMPLOYMENT RISE

BUDAPEST, Hungary, Sept. 2 (AP) — Three hundred persons were injured, 30 seriously, and one man was killed in a riot for food and work among the unemployed in Budapest streets yesterday. Communist agitation was blamed. Four of the seriously injured are policemen.

A large cylinder was built on the deck of the S-1, a smaller submarine than later types, for carrying the dismantled plane which was assembled for each flight. The scheme was abandoned as unsatisfactory.
