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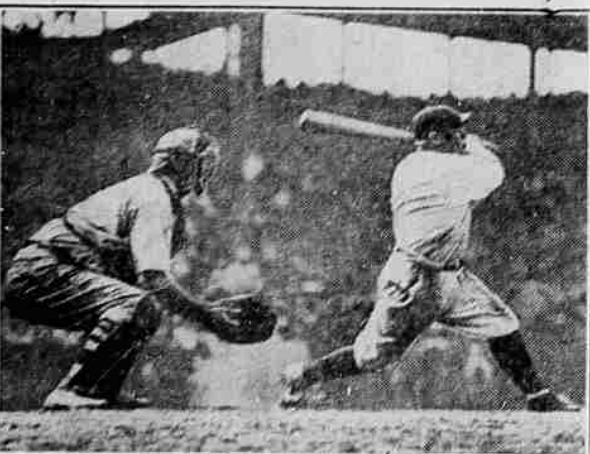


CHIEF JUSTICE EXPLAINS GAME

HAVANA, Sept. 5 (AP)—The hurricane which Wednesday almost destroyed the city of Santo Domingo, seemed somewhat northward today in its course. In view of the changed direction, Bureau of weather bureau along the Florida and Gulf coasts.

SANTO DOMINGO, Sept. 5 (AP)—An urgent appeal for help was sent from this city today as it counted the toll of the hurricane which swept across the republic Wednesday, taking an estimated 800 lives and leaving 90 per cent of this city's population homeless.

There is immediate need for food, clothing, medical supplies and temporary shelter, with untold suffering threatening the population not only of the capital city but of most of the republic unless supplies are received. Capping a climax of horrors, the water supply has failed and only limited fresh water is available.

More than half of the capital city is devastated. Roads were lifted off of buildings by the wind, which sometimes reached a velocity of more than 150 miles an hour. The American legation was roofed and the building partly destroyed. The great bridge across the Ozama river was destroyed, and all buildings of the Pan-American Airways were blown to pieces.

President Rafael Trujillo, in conference with Major Cary L. Crockett, representative of Governor Theodore Roosevelt of Porto Rico, who flew here from San Juan, and with American Minister Charles B. Curtis said 800 dead had been counted and the number in the city might reach even higher, with the remainder of the country yet to be heard from.

Major Crockett radioed Roosevelt saying the American minister with his staff and all Europeans were saved, but three-quarters of the houses in the city were destroyed and the entire city was badly damaged. He said hundreds of persons were injured.

Wheat Prices Climb In Chicago Today

CHICAGO, Sept. 5 (AP)—Encouraged by unexpected strength in Liverpool quotations, and by commission house buying, Chicago wheat prices advanced more than 1 cent a bushel at the start of trading today.

A better demand for cash wheat abroad, indicating that more business in North American grain might be expected, helped the rally. Corn was higher with wheat, but selling on resting orders halted the advance.

Trade was of larger volume opening 1/2 cent higher, wheat climbed 1/2 cent, and then reacted. Corn started 1/4 cent up and showed further strength.

**Confidence Felt
In Wool Market,
Bulletin To Say**

BOSTON, Sept. 5 (AP)—The commercial bulletin of Boston tomorrow will say: "While there has been no big movement this week, September has continued suspiciously in the wool market and there is noticeable air of quiet confidence through the trade. Prices are being steadily maintained with a tendency, if any, in favor of the seller."

The goods market continues to develop slowly, but evidently there is some business to be had and for this business the mills are securing their prices, there apparently is no chance to sell goods at lower rates and take it out of the wool dealers' profits this season. Top makers are fairly well engaged although new business is limited.

The season opened at the cape this week with prices quite up to expectations. The cape clip contains a rather heavier proportion than last year of the shorter 10-12 months wool. Values appear fairly steady in the European markets.
