Some of his instruments have a wonderful finish and his red varnish is of excep-tional quality. His instruments are scarce and sometimes branded.

RIPE TOMATO CHUTNEY FOR SLICED ROAST
Breakfast

Minced Ham Sandwich Filling
For 8 Sandwiches
2-3 cup chopped cooked ham.
1 hard cooked egg.
4 tablespoons chopped sweet pickles.
4 tablespoons chopped pimiento stuffed olives.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
3 tablespoons salad dressing.
Mix ingredients. Spread on but-tered slices of white bread. Add bits of lettuce and cover with other buttered slices of bread.
Ripe Tomato Chutney
1 cup chopped green peppers.
4 cups chopped tomatoes (ripe).
2 cups chopped green tomatoes.

4 cups chopped apples.
1 cup chopped onions.
2 tablespoons white mustard seed.
2 tablespoons celery seed.
1 teaspoon ground ginger.
3 tablespoons salt.
2 cups sugar.
1 teaspoon cinnamon.
1 teaspoon cloves.
4 cups vinegar.
Mix ingredients and boil gently 1 1/2 hours. Pour in bottles and seal.
Apricot Pudding
2 eggs.
3 tablespoons flour.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1/2 cup sugar.
2 1/2 cups milk.
1 cup apricots.
1 teaspoon vanilla.
1/2 teaspoon lemon extract.
Beat eggs and add flour, salt and sugar. Add milk and cook in double boiler until mixture thickens a little. Beat 2 minutes. Cool. Add other ingredients. Chill.

NEW TRANSFORMERS STRONG
PITTSFIELD, Mass. (S)—Power men now can snap their fingers at light-nig strokes that are not stronger than 3,000,000 volts.

High power line transformers were taken to the laboratory of F. W. Peek of the General Electric company here and banged with three million volt artificial lightning. They stood the shocks without a scratch of dam-age.

It was a pioneering feat, being the first time that such a test has been made indoors, and as a precaution the shooting was done after midnight when nearby shops were closed.

First Thermos Flask
Sir James Dewar, an eminent British chemist and physicist, who designed vacuum-jacketed vessels for the storage of gases after he had liquefied them, discovered the principle of the thermos flask about 1859, says Pathfinder Magazine. These flasks, known at first as Dewar bulbs, proved very effective in preventing the influx of external heat.

Hours for Sleep
The time of day appears to have little importance in influencing sleep, except that persons trying to sleep in the day are more fre-quently upset by noise and light. Pro-fessors of psychology who have con-ducted tests pertaining to sleep have found that persons sleep more soundly when they first go to sleep than they do in the latter part of sleep.
