Boy Alice After 1,000-Foot Fall
PORTLAND, Sept. 6 (AP)—With injuries no more serious than a fractured arm, William Carson, 15, was up and around today after having fallen over a one thousand foot cliff on the Columbia highway yesterday. In company with Delwin McKinney, 15, he had stopped near Crown Point and began, possibly, to throw rocks over the perpendicular wall of the cliff. He slipped and fell and rolled to the bottom. McKinney summoned aid. By means of ropes rescuers reached the boy who was unconscious. He responded to treatment rapidly and today said he was "as good as new."

W. JOHNSON DIES SUDDENL
SALEM, Ore., Sept. 6 (AP)—Walter Johnson, 61, for years a member of the Salem police force and for many other years guard at the state penitentiary died suddenly of apoplexy this morning while serving as special officer in a Marion county hospital. Johnson was a Salem policeman 20 years ago and made a notable criminal capture when he arrested Heiner Black after Black had attempted to hold up a Salem physician and had shot him. LEVIATHAN STRIKES BARGE
NEW YORK, Sept. 6 (AP)—The liner Leviathan, of the United States lines, struck and sank a railroad barge in the Hudson river at the foot of Charlton street as she sailed for Europe today.

The collision happened a few minutes after the liner, largest in the world, had left her pier at 9:30 a. m. for Cherbourg and Southampton. The barge was owned by the Central Railroad of New Jersey.
