Nacker Is Still In Glum Silence As Girl Talks

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Sept. 5.—Formally charged with murder in the first degree, Don Nacker, 21, today maintained the stolid silence with which he has greeted all questions as to his motive in killing Fred Dunbar of Klamath Falls.

Dunbar was shot to death without winking as he sat at the edge of Summit lake Monday with Doris Bacon of Salem. The slayer then beat the girl, trussed her and tied her to a tree. She escaped her bonds and spread the alarm. Nacker was arrested near the home of his stepfather.

Her iron nerve shattered and almost falling, Miss Bacon yesterday identified Nacker as Dunbar's slayer. As she confronted the young killer the girl pleaded with him to tell the truth and to explain his motives in firing four shots into Dunbar's body.

Nacker mumbled in a few words his previous contention that he had been hunting and had mistaken Dunbar for an animal.

Miss Bacon explained, however, that some time previous to the shooting she and Dunbar had observed Nacker watching them from the upper shore of the lake.

Nacker declared when questioned that he lost his memory when he found Dunbar dead and his mind was blank until he found himself standing beside the trussed girl.

Miss Bacon left Klamath Falls last night for her Salem home.

PORTLAND, Sept. 5.—Don Nacker, Klamath Falls slayer of Fred Dunbar, has been sought as a naval deserter since July 5, 1928, Patrolman Sidney Payne, Portland police bureau identification expert, declared today after investigation of department records.
