### ST. LOUIS CROWDS CUBS CLOSELY

#### Giants, Running Third, Have Hopes Raised in Race.

The National pennant race depends on the final inter-sectional series between the St. Louis Cardinals and the Chicago Cubs. The Cardinals have done well so far this season in entertaining westerners, while the Cubs have turned in about as many victories in the east as their stay-at-home rivals.

The St. Louis Cardinals now hold second place and are closer to the league leading Cubs than any team has been for some time.

A double victory over the Cincinnati Reds yesterday, 11 to 6 and 4 to 2, made seven straight victories and a clean sweep of the eleven home games against Cincinnati.

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 8 (AP)—The national men's singles tennis championships entered the second day of competition today with one outstanding attraction on the sidelines.

Jean Borotra, out of France's famous Davis Cup team, was eliminated in the first round on Saturday by the fiery little Texan, Berkeley Bell, 3-6, 6-2, 12-10, 7-5.

NEW YORK, Sept. 8 (AP)—America's greatest professionals gathered at the Fresh Meadow club today for the 136-hole qualifying round of the professional golfers' association championship.

The course is 6500 yards with a par of 35-35-70.

Today's 96-hole round provides a field of 32 for match play starting tomorrow. All match play rounds will be at 36 holes.

Some Unopposed  
Neither Senator Keyes nor Representative Fletcher and Hale and Edward H. Watson are opposed in New Hampshire for the republican nomination but democrats will choose between Albert W. Noone and Amos N. Blandin to oppose Keyes in the election.

No senate contests occur in the remainder of Tuesday's primaries which are in Vermont, Arizona and Washington. The republicans of Vermont have three candidates for governor, W. Arthur Simpson, Stanley C. Wilson and John W. Gordon.

In Arizona Governor John C. Phillips, republican, is up for re-election, with four democrats seeking the right to oppose him. Representatives Lewis W. Wednesday's only primary will be in Georgia where Senator William J. Harris is opposed for democratic re-nomination by former Governor John M. Statton. Five candidates seek the governorship while only three representatives have opposition.

### Francis Brown Is Golf King In California

PEBBLE BEACH, Cal., Sept. 8 (AP)—Ten years after he first set out to conquer new golfing worlds, Francis J. Brown, sun bronzed sportsman from Hawaii, has reached his goal—the California amateur championship.

Contender five times since 1920, the stocky, hard driving entrant from Honolulu reached the end of a long trail yesterday with a smashing 10-9 victory over Fay Coleman, young Los Angeles star, in the 36-hole final.

In all his previous competition for California's Simon Pure honors, Brown failed to get past the second round. This time he blazed a path through a strong and representative field of 179 players of 0-7 handicap to win by the largest score since the classic was inaugurated 22 years ago.

Riding on the crest of a stellar game, Brown overwhelmed his opponents in decisive fashion.

### Eastern Polo Is Echoed in Okla.

TULSA, Okla., (AP)—Polo is coming into its own in Oklahoma, the third youngest state in the union. Seven clubs have been organized in the state within the last few years, part of them recently.

"Klan Radicals" Charged  
The three last named are accused of directing the "Klan radicals," a group which was held responsible for the firing from the crowd, on the cadets in the Plaza Congreso Saturday. Irigoyen was imprisoned in a military barracks. Guards about the place professed to be there to prevent any of the populace, which two years ago returned him to office by an overwhelming vote, from harming him.

Irigoyen resigned Friday evening under a constitutional provision which would permit his return to office at his pleasure. His powers were newly delegated to Dr. Enrique Martinez, vice president. The populace, students particularly, considered the retirement merely an artifice and Saturday morning troops multiplied to enforce their demand for actual resignation. The navy joined them and the movement, headed by General Uriburu, by nightfall had the city under control.
