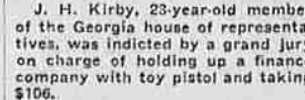

## Menus Of The Day

**CHICKEN SOUFFLE FOR LUNCHEON**  
 (A Party)  
 Grapefruit Oriental  
 Chicken Souffle  
 Sauce  
 Browned Potato Balls  
 Buttered Peas  
 Black Raspberry Preserves  
 Cucumber Salad  
 Cheesed Wafers  
 Peach Shortcake  
 Coffee

**Grape Fruit Oriental**  
 5 halves grape fruit (chilled).  
 1 quart milk ice.  
 8 red cherries.  
 Loosen segments of grape fruit. Arrange grape fruit on light green paper doilies, on serving plates. Top with portions of ice and garnish with cherries.

**Chicken Souffle**  
 1/2 cup butter or chicken fat.  
 2-3 cup flour.  
 4 cups milk.  
 1 teaspoon salt.  
 1/2 teaspoon pepper.  
 1/2 teaspoon celery salt.  
 4 tablespoons chopped green peppers.  
 4 tablespoons chopped pimientos.  
 2 tablespoons chopped parsley.  
 5 egg yolks.  
 3 cups diced chicken.  
 5 egg whites, stiffly beaten.  
 Melt butter and add flour. Blend and add milk. Cook until thick sauce forms. Stir constantly. Add seasonings, egg yolks and chicken and beat 3 minutes. Fold in egg whites. Pour into greased baking dish. Set in pan of hot water and bake 50 minutes in slow oven.

**Browned Potato Balls**  
 4 cups potato balls.  
 1 quart water, boiling.  
 1 teaspoon salt.  
 4 tablespoons butter.  
 2 tablespoons lard.  
 1/2 teaspoon paprika.  
 2 tablespoons chopped parsley.  
 Cut balls with French vegetable cutter from raw potatoes. Mix water and salt and when boiling add balls.

 8 slices white cake.  
 3 cups fresh peaches.

Ready Cooked Wheat and Bran Cereal

**Cocoanut Rice Pudding**  
 2 cups milk.  
 1/2 cup yellow cream cheese.  
 1 teaspoon chopped onions.  
 2 tablespoons finely chopped green pepper.  
 1/2 teaspoon salt.  
 1/2 teaspoon paprika.  
 1/2 teaspoon celery salt.  
 2 tablespoons salad dressing.  
 Cream the cheese with a fork. Add rest of ingredients and when soft and creamy spread on buttered slices of graham or white bread.

**Candied Sweet Potatoes**  
 6 cooked potatoes (peeled).  
 4 tablespoons bacon fat.  
 1/2 cup dark brown sugar.  
 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon.  
 1 tablespoon butter.  
 1 tablespoon hot water.  
 Heat bacon fat in a frying pan. Add and brown the potatoes. Sprinkle with the sugar and add rest of ingredients. Cook slowly until the sugar has melted and glazed the potatoes.

**Cocoanut Rice Pudding**  
 2-3 cup sugar.  
 5 tablespoons flour.  
 1/2 teaspoon salt.  
 2 egg yolks.  
 2 cups milk.  
 1 teaspoon vanilla.  
 1/2 teaspoon lemon extract.  
 1/2 cups cooked rice.  
 3 egg whites, beaten.  
 3 tablespoons confectioner's sugar.  
 1/2 cup cocoanut.  
 Mix the sugar, flour and salt. Add egg yolks and milk. Cook in a double boiler until a little thick. Stir frequently. Add extracts and rice. Pour into buttered baking dish. Mix confectioner's sugar with the beaten egg whites and beat in the cocoanut.
