Klamath Falls Has Rhea Luper Twixt Two Fires

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 8 (AP)—With irrigation interests in Klamath county applying for a permit for the California-Oregon Power company to proceed with its development on Klamath river, and with banking and business interests urging that he expedite action in favor of the company, State Engineer Luper is between two fires as far as that district is concerned.

Luper, however, has stated that no permit will be issued until after the 1931 legislature.

A letter received by Luper today from A. M. Thomas, secretary of the Klamath irrigation district, says, relative to Luper's withholding a permit for the grant of development, that "your position has the approval of at least 75 per cent of the people of Klamath county and Klamath Falls."

"The California-Oregon Power company has always managed to dominate our local chamber of commerce with a few key men. It is stated that that body has passed a resolution urging you to grant the permit, and one of our 'service clubs' also. If this resolution could be referred to the membership of the chamber, it would be repudiated by a very large majority."

From J. A. Gordon, president, and E. M. Hubb, cashier of the National Bank at Klamath Falls, this telegram came today:

"The banks of Klamath Falls are vitally interested in the construction of the proposed power plant on the Klamath river by the California-Oregon Power company. This construction will take up the unemployment which will be caused by the closing down of logging camps and sawmills this fall, and is certain that business and financial affairs in this district will be given a decided stimulus by such work during the coming winter and spring. We urge you to do everything in your power to relieve this unemployment by immediate construction."

Communications from the Klamath county chamber of commerce, signed by E. M. Hubb as president, and from the Klamath Lions club, urging that the permit be granted, were received by Luper several days ago.

Rain Puts Price Up On Tomatoes; Eggs Unchanged

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 8 (AP)—Wholesale butter and egg prices were unchanged in Portland today with supply and demand fair to good on both.

The peach deal was considered definitely beyond the season's peak with no more full car shipments expected from the Walla Walla district. Best quality boxes were selling at \$1.10. Weekend rains were a setback to the previously liberal Oregon tomato supply and effected the price tone upward though good quality could be had at 50 to 60 cents a box.

Cauliflower was about 25 cents weaker a crate than a week ago at \$1.25 to \$1.50.

Sweet potatoes were 1/2 cent weaker at 5 to 5 1/2 cents a pound.

U. S. No. 1 potatoes were ranging from \$1.10 to \$1.25 a hundred, a price tone for the week's opening but about 25 cents below price ranges of a week ago.

Stocks Gain As Drive Continues

NEW YORK, Sept. 8 (AP)—With the general level of share prices in the critical area that brought grief to the July bull campaign, bullish stock market operators today continued to drive on toward new high levels for the recovery from the June deflation.

Although several of the leading shares, such as U. S. Steel, were somewhat sluggish, a wide assortment of issues was marked up 1 to 3 points, with a few wide movers gaining 5 or more. Issues advancing 1 to more than 2 points included American Can, American Telephone, Kennecott, North American, General Motors, Chrysler, Radio Keith, Air Reduction, Sears Roebuck, Dupont, Stone and Webster, Gulf States Steel, Southern Pacific, Transamerica, and Lehman Corp. Colombian Gas, Auburn and Diamond Match gained more than 5.

CHOLERA STRIKES MANILA

MANILA, Sept. 8 (AP)—Thirty cases of cholera have been reported in Manila among natives, with nine deaths in the past ten days. No Americans or Europeans have been stricken, and practically all of them have been vaccinated.

The disease has been prevalent some time in the provinces, but is reported diminishing there.

The situation is considered not serious yet by local reports. They said they believed it could be controlled without serious extension.

BROMLEY FLIGHT DELAYED

AOMORI, Japan, Sept. 8 (AP)—Harold L. Bromley will not be able to take off on his projected flight to Tacoma, Wash., before Thursday or Friday at the earliest. Preparation of a ramp runway at Aomori, near here, is expected to require two or three days.

COMMUNISTS CAPTURE SHASTA

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8 (AP)—The state department was informed today that communists had captured the city of Shasta in Hupeh province, where several Americans are known to reside.

Three Free Entry Ports Proposed

PORTLAND, Sept. 8 (AP)—Reactions here were varied on the proposal of Jefferson Myers, North Pacific coast shipping board commissioner, for establishment of three free entry ports in the United States. Myers' suggestion was made in a survey published today at San Francisco. He proposed establishment of a free port on the Pacific, the Gulf and the Atlantic, such ports to be manufacturing areas to which foreign raw material, not generally produced in the United States, could be imported duty free and the finished product exported.

Dan C. Freeman, manager of the Oregon Manufacturers' association, expressed opposition to the proposal for "free ports for manufacturing." He urged Portland business and industry to get behind the movement, that this city might be made the Pacific free port.

C. G. Ballard, district freight agent of the American Mail Line, said "I don't think the idea is any good. If one port gets free entry all should get it. Any regular customs port should receive it."

The proposal as outlined, he said, appears unfair. If one port got free entry, all would demand it. Ballard said, and the ultimate result would be free trade.

SEEKS CIRCUIT JUDGE OFFICE

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 8 (AP)—John A. Caffrey, of Portland, who was a candidate for the republican nomination for governor in the May primary election, is an independent candidate for circuit judge of department No. 2, fourth judicial district. His certificate of nomination by assembly was received by the secretary of state today. The assembly that nominated Jeffrey met in Portland Aug. 21. His opponent is the incumbent, Judge Robert Morrow, who received both the republican and the democratic nominations.

RECALL OUT IN GRANTS PASS

GRANTS PASS, Sept. 8 (AP)—A petition for the recall of C. E. Rusk, justice of peace, was being circulated here today. The movement to oust the official is reported to center in a Grant Pass salarman for alleged possession of home brew in his home.

WHEAT SHOWS ACTIVITY
